

The Queensland Government is committed to increasing public transport use and has a track record of investing in public transport infrastructure to support our growing population.

Since the introduction of Fairer Fares in late 2016, which lowered the average adult fare by about 13.5 per cent compared to January 2014 fares, we have experienced a steady rise in public transport use

Last financial year, more than 182 million trips taken across South East Queensland's public transport network.

Looking forward, the delivery of Cross River Rail will only further increase the attractiveness of public transport for commuters in South East Queensland.

Cross River Rail is a once in a generation investment and the Queensland Government's number one infrastructure project.

- 1. It is a shame all of the information regarding land acquisition is just background. Why is that the case?
- 2. Anyway, Can I please find out how large the land requirement at Goodwin Terrace and 1827 Gold Coast Hwy is estimated to be?
- 3. Also, I have been told by business owners around Goodwin Terrace that they have been given reasons why the station is at this new location instead of Connor St and Gold Coast Hwy.
- 4. Can I please find out why that is the case?
- 5. Also, where else has there been and requirements identified along the 3A route?
- 6. Has the Department of Transport and Main Roads spoken to the owners of the service station and Burleigh Heads Bowls Club about land resumption?
- 7. Could the government enforce compulsory land acquisition if an agreed sales price is reached for the service station?
- 8. How many other property owners has the Department spoken to about land resumption for Stage 3A of the light rail?
- 9. Why is the Department of Transport discussing land resumption with property owners before the feasibility study and community consultation has been completed?

Response:

Stage 3A is the proposed light rail extension from Broadbeach South light rail station to Burleigh Heads.

Any property owners who have been identified on the current reference design for Stage 3A and may be impacted, have been contacted by the project team with meetings and discussions ongoing.

Impacted property owners are contacted ahead of community consultation so they are aware there is a possible need for their property.

There are no compulsory acquisitions being progressed at this time. Invitations have been extended to private property owners to participate in a voluntary early acquisition process. This process allows impacted

private property owners to voluntarily elect to participate and this can allow acquisitions to be brought forward.

As part of the detailed business case and as a courtesy, we also contact stakeholders near the Stage 3A project who may be generally impacted by the project (not by a property requirement).

Due to privacy issues we are not be able to supply numbers or details of potential property resumptions for Stage 3A.



We completed the southern section of the Southport–Burleigh Road network improvement project, between Fremar Street and Ruda Street in Broadbeach Waters, in February 2016.

This one-kilometre section of Southport–Burleigh Road is locally known as Bermuda Street.

The footpath, on Bermuda Street, was not within the scope of works for the Southport–Burleigh Road upgrade.

We did not change the gradient of this footpath and it remains as it was before the road-widening project being undertaken.

Under TMR/Local Governments cost-sharing agreement, the City of Gold Coast Council (CoGC) is responsible for the management of footways, footpaths and shared paths.

This footpath falls under the management of the CoGC.

- We are committed to investing in South-East Queensland roads.
- Our priority remains focused on ensuring South-East Queensland people can get home as quickly and safely as possible instead of being stuck in

traffic.

- Current projects underway in the Gold Coast region include:
 - Stapleton Jacobs Well Road is the only State road, apart from the M1, within the Northern Gold Coast region (Coomera, Pimpama, Yatala).
 - Stapleton Jacobs Well Road bridge replacement at Behm Creek September 2017.
 - Exit 54 –\$74.4 million upgrade of the Pacific Motorway Coomera Interchange (Exit 54) was completed in December 2016.
- Upgrading the interchange at Smith Street Motorway and Labrador— Carrara Road (Olsen Avenue) intersection, and improvements on Smith Street Motorway east of the Pacific Motorway were all completed in 2015
- Delivery of Stage 2 of the Gold Coast Light Rail, the northern connection to heavy rail at Helensvale was completed on 17 December 2017.

We have also invested \$160.7m to address many of the known congestion points in the network ahead of the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games. These works included:

- o Ashmore Road/Ross Street roundabout completed in June 2016

I am writing a story on Stage 3A of the Gold Cost Light Rail. Following in from the video released by the Government the proposed station at Burleigh Heads is on the corner of the Gold Coast Hwy and Goodwin Terrace. An artists impression shows it there and the service station at 1827 Gold Coast Hey has been removed to make way for the road.

- Can I please find out if this location is the preferred spot for the station at Burleigh Heads?
- If it is not preferred is it an option?
- Also, under this option would the service station be taken and built into a road?
- Has the department spoken to the service station owners about taking this land?
- If so, how many times?

Can I please get a response regarding this today?

RESPONSE

Transport and Main Roads and Building Queensland, in partnership with City of Gold Coast, is developing a detailed business case for a third extension of the Gold Coast light rail.

The Stage 3A reference design has identified a preferred alignment using the existing Gold Coast Highway road corridor with the alignment in the centre of the highway with two lanes of traffic in each direction from Broadbeach South light rail station to Burleigh Heads.

The revised location of the Burleigh Heads station in the reference design has taken into account the need for a station on the Gold Coast Highway at Goodwin Terrace.

Station location will consider safe pedestrian connections to the beach, shopping and dining precincts. The location will also minimise impacts on the Norfolk Pines beachfront as well as surrounding parks including Memorial Park at the Burleigh Heads Bowls Club.

It will also provide improved connectivity to TransLink buses while working with operational requirements of the light rail system.

Property impacts have been minimised as much as possible during the Gold Coast Light Rail Stage 3A extension design.

A land requirement has been identified in the reference design that will allow the Gold Coast Highway to be reconfigured and widened maintaining two traffic lanes near the Goodwin Terrace intersection.

Any property owners who may be impacted have already been contacted by the Stage 3A project team and discussions are ongoing.

Compensation is payable for land acquired for the light rail system as determined in accordance with TMR policies and relevant legislation.

Due to privacy issues we are not be able to supply details of potential property resumptions for the proposed Stage 3A.

The Queensland Government has invested more than \$11 million in the Brisbane Valley railway corridor.

The Brisbane Valley railway corridor was closed to operational traffic in 1989 and has been progressively developed into a rail trail by the State Government since 2007.

Between 2007 and 2012, the Queensland Government spent \$4.7m on capital works to develop the Brisbane Valley Rail Trail (BVRT) as part of a wider funding program for the development of recreational trails in SEQ.

In 2014, under the State Government's Royalties for the Regions funding program, \$1.8m was allocated to the BVRT.

In late 2015, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) took over sole responsibility for management of the BVRT including overseeing development of the remaining closed sections between Toogoolawah and Moore, and Brassall to Wanora.

In January 2016, the Queensland Government announced the \$1.8m allocated under the Royalties for the Regions would be directed to complete the Toogoolawah to Moore section.

In 2016-17, TMR spent about \$170,000 on capital improvements to the BVRT, including funding to develop the unopened section between Brassall and Wanora.

In 2017-18, TMR committed a further \$260,000 on improvement works to the trail.

In addition, TMR is also funding \$4.5million on rehabilitation works to the state heritage-listed Lockyer Creek Rail Bridge between Lowood and Coominya, including installing a new pedestrian/cyclist walkway.

Our response is as follows.

The State Government in collaboration with local councils and other partners is rolling out the Queensland Electric Super Highway to encourage, support and accelerate the uptake of electric vehicles across the state. The first phase of the highway, completed on 31 January 2018, allows drivers to travel all the way from Coolangatta to Cairns and west to Toowoomba in an electric vehicle.

Since the charging stations were installed, we have recorded more than 785 charging sessions, with more than 58 in the last month alone.

We didn't set specific goals for use but the data indicates a strong overall response with a very high uptake in some regions.

Charging stations are currently located about 200km apart with that distance set to effectively halve thanks to the \$2.5 million funding commitment for phase 2 of the QESH included in the 2018-19 state budget.

We know the most used charger is in Cairns, with more than 300 charge sessions and 3700 kWh of energy transferred.

The second most popular is the Gold Coast, more than 166 sessions and 2700 kWh of energy.

We have had no reports of misuse or damage.

Some intermittent faults, consistent with the introduction of new technology, have been addressed such as at Bowen (internal charger error and nuisance tripping) and in Carmila, south of Mackay (nuisance trips).

The Future is Electric: Queensland's Electric Vehicle Strategy was delivered in October last year had cemented the state's commitment to electric vehicles.

We are the only state or territory to develop a comprehensive approach to encourage the adoption of electric vehicles in Australia and we are continuing to deliver the 16 actions outlined in the strategy.



I've had a couple of people come forward claiming they've been sacked for raising safety issues at the TSRC project.

"We elected a few new (health and safety representatives).... And within two days, one of those was sacked, along with another worker that was voicing his opinion about not working in a lightning storm. He didn't want to be operating with a crane in the lightning storm, and had an argument with the supervisor that afternoon. After he left work that day he was told he didn't have a job anymore. It's happened quite regularly."

Another worker refused to work with a crane driver without him being VOC'd. He got sacked afterwards.

A third worker with 45 years experience in the industry said he was originally working on a compactor, in tandem with a grader, to make the job safer for himself and others. The company said he would no longer have the grader assisting him. He said he was going to complain, and that night he was sacked.

The State Government has allocated \$500,000 to undertake transport planning to improve the Caloundra Road and Nicklin Way intersection.

We have completed investigations with the preferred option being a two-stage approach.

The proposed first stage will be an extension of Third Avenue (a council-controlled road) to a new signalised intersection with Nicklin Way. This will provide an alternative route for motorists travelling between the Caloundra CBD and areas to the north, which will reduce traffic volumes through the

Caloundra Road and Nicklin Way intersection.

We are currently developing a business case for this stage.

The proposed second stage is the upgrade to a fully signalised intersection. This will include left-turn filter lanes (slip lanes) along with pedestrian crossings and cycle lanes on each approach. Funding to progress planning for these improvements will be carefully considered against priorities across the state.

In addition, the Aura development partly preserves a future east-west transport corridor from Bells Creek Arterial Road to Pelican waters. Funding and timelines for further detailed planning and the construction of the east-west ink are yet to be determined. TMR reviews its program of future work annually and this project will be considered during the next program review.

The development also preserves a corridor for the future extension of Bells Creek Arterial Road to the Bruce Highway.

Holding statement

Nexus has informed the Queensland Government that it is expecting a delay of around four to seven months for the completion of the Toowoomba Second Range Crossing (TSRC).

Nexus has advised that while the project is progressing well overall, the delay is due to a complex geological issue under one of the embankments in the Ballard area.

The issue has resulted in Nexus changing the construction methodology and building the foundation of the embankment from a deeper level. As result, extensive additional earthworks are now required in a small section of the project.

All other scheduled activities for the project are progressing well and will continue as planned.

Nexus will update the community as soon as the extent of the delays and construction impacts are known.

Response

The Queensland government is serious about addressing congestion on the road network by not just building more roads. That is why the Queensland government is delivering public transport improvements across the south east Queensland region and delivering Cross River Rail.

Cross River Rail will give commuters a viable alternative to driving, and take 18000 trips a day off our road network here in the south east of the state, significantly relieving congestion.

In addition to the known and significant congestion benefits of CRR, through the Fairer Fares policy, the Queensland Government has reduced fares and made public transport more accessible, relieving pressure on our roads.

In Queensland, congestion mitigation outcomes are being delivered by proactively managing network operations. This includes managed motorways, traffic incident management, traffic signal optimisation, QLDTraffic traveller information, public transport journey planning and using data, systems and innovative technologies to better understand our transport network.

The Queensland government welcomes innovative proposals that may lead to more optimal use of our infrastructure or lead to sustainable funding outcomes for the State.

However, all options must address concerns surrounding equity and fairness. As a result, the Queensland government policy is not to pursue road user charging but to work with the Commonwealth on long term road funding reform.

With road related revenue falling, options for a more sustainable road funding system are being examined to provide a more transparent link between road use and provision of infrastructure.

Several recent independent reports have argued for a move towards cost reflective road user charging, including the Productivity Commission, the Competition Policy (Harper) Review and Infrastructure Australia's Australian Infrastructure Audit in 2016. The Australian Automobile Association (AAA) has also indicated support for such a move. These calls are principally aimed at addressing the looming funding gap rather than congestion.

The Australian Government has indicated its intention to undertake a study into the potential benefits and impacts of cost reflective pricing for light vehicles of coad users. Any policy solution on this matter needs to be federally led, address privacy and equity concerns and should start with improved heavy vehicle charging.

Response:

On March 26, we awarded a contract to The Infrastructure Group (a joint venture between Bielby, BMD Constructions, JF Hull and Albem Pty Ltd with ARUP Group and HDR Inc) for design and construction of the Haughton River Floodplain project.

As part of the project:

- New wider bridges will be built over Horseshoe Lagoon, Pink Lily Lagoon and Haughton River, as well as bridges to replace existing floodways at Healey's Lagoon and the Reed Beds;
- A significant number of drains will be installed to improve water flow and address flooding;
- 13.5km of the Bruce Highway will be tograded to improve conditions for motorists (from 9km north of the Haughton River bridge to 5km south)
- Nine rural intersections with the Bluce Highway will be upgraded to improve safety;
- Overpasses of the existing cane tramway crossings will be built at Hodel and Shirbourne Roads; and
- One-metre-wide centre line treatment will be installed to improve safety, similar to what we have on other Bruce Highway projects in recent years.

These safety, efficiency and flood immunity upgrades are critical to the people of North Queensland, who rely on the Bruce Highway for access to essential services, and transportation of goods.

Now the design and construction contract has been awarded, we will start detailed design. Early works are currently expected to start in August 2018 (subject to weather), following acceleration of the project under an early contractor involvement arrangement.

We have been engaging with the community about the project hydrology, connectivity and land requirements since 2014. Consultation with affected landholders next to the existing highway regarding resumptions occurred throughout 2017, once the project footprint was determined. The highway upgrade is being built next to and upstream of the existing highway, because of the need to substantially raise the level of the highway, including the new high-level bridges and larger culverts.

Minimising resumptions was an important consideration when choosing the new highway alignment. The land which has been acquired for the project will be purchased by the department.

Questions:

We had a call from a motorist this morning upset about one lane of Ray Jones Dr being closed off before Lyons St for about 20m.

Apparently there was just a DTMR worker standing there - probably for lawn mowing.

She was concerned this morning at peak hour was chosen to shut off the road, given how busy traffic was with all the flooding around the region.

Any chance you could get us a couple of lines about what the closure was for, and why it was decided to carry out the works this morning?

Response

Ray Jones Drive was closed this morning to allow for urgent, immediate repair of a large pothole that occurred as a result of the extreme wet weather currently being experienced in the Far North.

Our crew worked as quickly as possible to rectify the situation and to ensure motorists' safety. The pothole has been repaired and the road is now open.





Response (please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

When deciding to install a school zone, Brisbane City Council (BCC) is required to ensure the school zone is consistent with our school zone guidelines.

This is to ensure that school zones are implemented consistently across the state.

School zones are intended to promote the safety of children walking, cycling, and getting on and off public transport, on the roads closest to the schools.

The guideline allows for a school zone on multi-lane roads where there is a mid-block crossing or where children are required to cross in large numbers at an intersection, and where there is direct access to the school from the multi-lane road.

If the school zone meets the guideline requirements, then it is the decision of the relevant road authority on whether it installs the school zone. In this case as Newman Road is a BCC road, it is council's decision on whether a school zone is installed.

The safety of school children at St Catherine's is important.

We have met with both BCC and the school community to discuss road safety around the school.

We will continue to work with the school to ensure the safety of the children attending.

The school, parents and Ms McMillan are calling on this to be fixed. More than 100 parents have signed a petition.

St Catherine's sits on the crest of a hill on Newnham Road. During school drop-off and pick-up times a large number of cars enter and exit the school. Many cars have to turn in front of oncoming traffic or edge out into traffic from between other vehicles to get

onto Newnham Road.

The current 60 kilometre speed limit means parents' vehicles have little time to turn safely into

passing traffic, especially when it comes up quickly over the crest of the hill.

It would be great if you could please get some info back to me on whether TMR is/has been looking into this and what will be done to fix the safety issue.



Response (please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

The reduced speed limit for bike riders sign on Caloundra Road is the first of its type in Queensland.

This sign was installed by contractors on the Bruce Highway upgrade project from Caloundra Road to Sunshine Motorway.

The speed limit on Caloundra Road interchange bridge was initially reduced to 40km/h due to concerns about bike rider safety. This was due to narrow or no shoulders and low height bridge parapet.

The driver compliance with this reduced speed limit was low and motorists didn't readily associate the reduction with risks faced by bike riders.

In an attempt to improve safety, we implemented a treatment that is used in South Australia that only requires drivers to reduce their speed when there are vulnerable road users present.

These signs can be used where road constraints require bike riders to 'take a lane'.

Changes to speed limits can significantly impact bike riders. In cases where bike riders are required to share the road space with other traffic, a reduction in the speed limit can significantly improve the chances of a bike rider surviving a crash, as well as reducing the severity of injuries.

Reduced speed limits aimed at improving safety for vulnerable road users have been shown to be more effective when drivers appreciate the reason to moderate their speed.

This approach has been adopted in South Australia at school zones. Motorists are only required to reduce speed (to 25km/h) when children are present. The appeal of this approach is that motorists are not required to reduce their speed when there is no risk – voluntary compliance is better and more accepted.

With this experience in mind, we developed a similar treatment that requires drivers to reduce speed only when bike riders are present.

The 2005–2026 South East Queensland Regional Plan is a statutory plan to manage growth and development in South East Queensland to 2026.

The Western Brisbane Transport Network Strategy (WBTNS) is a fully integrated multimodal approach to the transport needs of western Brisbane. It provides a vision to guide all levels of government in developing an integrated network that caters for walking and bike riding, rail, bus, roads and freight.

Regarding the Centenary Motorway, we are currently planning to upgrade the motorway to improve safety and cut travel times in the western Brisbane suburbs, Ipswich, Springfield and beyond.

The proposed new Centenary Bridge involves building a new, wider northbound bridge. It will provide an improvement to traffic flow and supplement active transport across the river.

While transit lanes and bus priorities are not being included in this project, they are being considered as part of the Centenary Motorway Planning Study which is investigating extra general purpose lanes and/or transit lanes.

In addition, we are upgrading the Sumners Road Interchange it will duplicate the overpass bridge over Centenary Motorway to improve capacity and increase efficiency, reducing bus connection times to Darra train station.

The upgrade also includes active transport options with provision for bike riding, shared paths and dedicated crossing facilities.

The Gateway Upgrade North project is being jointly funded by the federal and state governments. It includes widening the motorway from four to six lanes (three lanes in each direction) from Nudgee to Deagon.

The project team is progressing the widening works and they are on track to open by the end of 2018.

The motorway is currently operating with two lanes of traffic open in each direction at a reduced speed of 80 km/h, throughout the length of the project, to allow for construction to progress.

Provision has been made on parts of the project to allow for future upgrades when needed to widen the motorway to four-lanes in each direction. Bridge widths, pavement widths, the alignment of on and off-ramps, and the placement of utilities and services, have all been considered in the current upgrade, to accommodate this upgrade.

Additional funding would be required to upgrade the motorway to four-lanes in each direction. This would need to compete against other statewide priorities.

And are there plans to expand the network?

Suggested response

The Helensvale charging station will be completed following upgrade works at the park-n-ride carpark expected later this year.

From 31 January 2018, motorists have been able to use the Queensland Electric Vehicle Super Highway sites at: Bowen, Cairns, Carmila, Childers, Gatton, Hamilton, Gold Coast Airport (Coolangatta), Mackay, Marlborough, Maryborough, Miriam Vale, Rockhampton, Springfield, Sunshine Coast (Cooroy), Townsville, Toowoomba and Tully.

The fast-charging stations will be available for use at no cost, for the first 12 months of the Queensland Electric Super Highway.

Usage data will be assessed to determine optimal costings.

This will take into account the cost of providing the service, other value added services, and the need to ensure maximum use.

We can't confirm the figures Canstar use to determine the cost of charging at public fast charging station.

Research shows most people will charge their electric vehicle at home, generally overnight.

Home charging is significantly cheaper than a traditional fossil fuel vehicle, with fuel cost reducing to approximately \$0.50 for an equivalent-litre.

With competition in the energy market, different energy companies provide discounted energy deals for electric vehicle customers which also can reduce the cost of operating an electric vehicle.

The Queensland Government committed a further \$2.5 million under *Future Proofing the Bruce* to build additional sites reducing the distance between charging stations along the QESH.

All of the electricity will be from Green Energy using green energy credits and offsets making it a carbon friendly, pollutant free transport option.

Bruce Highway Flood Immunity Upgrade

Planning is underway for an \$11 million upgrade of the Bruce Highway at Tully to improve flood immunity.

Federal Deputy Prime Minister and Infrastructure and Transport Minister Michael McCormack said the project was part of a package of works delivering a safer Bruce Highway for all motorists.

"This project is part of the 10-year Bruce Highway Upgrade Program, an \$8.5 billion program of works jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments, with the Australian Government contributing \$6.7 billion and the Queensland Government contributing \$1.8 billion.

"This program is aimed at improving the highway from Brisbane to Cairns, contributing to improving the safety, capacity and flood resilience along the length of the highway," Mr McCormack said.

"This will continue as further projects are completed during the remaining five years of the program."

Queensland Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the project would alleviate the impact flooding on the Bruce Highway at Dallachy Road near Tully.

"The Bruce Highway continues to be a key priority and this project is just another example of our commitment to improving it for all users," Mr Bailey said.

"An average of 24 direct jobs will be supported over the life of this project.

"We are targeting areas regularly affected by flooding so Queensland is better prepared for wet weather events.

"We have started stakeholder engagement with directly affected businesses and land owners and will continue to keep the community updated on the progress of the project.

"We expect to have a business case finalised for the project by late December.

Works are progressing on the Eton Range Realignment Project which is due to be completed mid-2019.

A small section of the new alignment at the bottom of the range was completed and opened to traffic in January 2018.

Works are continuing on the project's many Reinforced Earth Embankments (REE's).

The most critical part of the works, REE 2 is located around the upper hairpin bend and can now be seen from the bottom of the range. Once completed, REE 2 will be 780 metres in length, up to 45 metres high and will widen part of the range to four lanes.

The next traffic switch is scheduled to take place in late 2018 when works on the main reinforced earth embankment are completed, and traffic is moved to operate on the new 'down' alignment (one lane in each direction) while works on the new 'do' alignment are finalised.

The Koala Research Project started field work in August 2016 and is due to be completed around August this year.

The research project involves tracking koala movements around the Clarke Connors Range. The findings will help inform the development of strategies to help protect fauna within a transport environment.

For your information only, we've received another media enquiry about the bike speed sign on Caloundra Road.

Following is our previous approved response which I'll send through to mins now.

Response (please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

The reduced speed limit for bike riders sign on Caloundra Road is the first of its type in Queensland.

This sign was installed by contractors on the Bruce Highway upgrade project from Caloundra Road to Sunshine Motorway.

The speed limit on Caloundra Road interchange bridge was initially reduced to 40km/h due to concerns about bike rider safety. This was due to narrow or no shoulders and low height bridge parapet.

The driver compliance with this reduced speed limit was low and motorists didn't readily associate the reduction with risks faced by bike riders.

In an attempt to improve safety, we implemented a treatment that is used in South Australia that only requires drivers to reduce their speed when there are vulnerable road users present.

These signs can be used where road constraints require bike riders to 'take a lane'.

Changes to speed limits can significantly impact bike riders. In cases where like riders are required to share the road space with other traffic, a reduction in the speed limit can significantly improve the chances of a bike rider surviving a crash, as well as reducing the severity of injuries.

Reduced speed limits aimed at improving safety for vulnerable road users have been shown to be more effective when drivers appreciate the reason to moderate their speed.

This approach has been adopted in South Australia at school zones. Motorists are only required to reduce speed (to 25km/h) when children are present. The appeal of this approach is that motorists are not required to reduce their speed when there is no risk voluntary compliance is better and more accepted.

With this experience in mind, we developed a similar treatment that requires drivers to reduce speed only when bike riders are present.







Response (please attribute to a Maritime Safety Queensland spokesperson):

All registered Queensland regulated ships and boats more than five metres in length must carry firefighting equipment.

Having the right safety equipment on any boat and knowing how to use it is essential to save your life in an emergency.

To comply with your general safety obligations, you should carry the appropriate safety equipment which includes appropriate firefighting equipment.

For example a yacht that does not require registration isn't required by regulation to carry firefighting equipment.

Although a responsible skipper would ensure the galley had a fire blanket to smother cooking fires and an appropriate extinguisher for any other fires above or below decks.

On smaller craft, a bailing bucket could be an effective firefighting asset.

It is the responsibility of the boat owners to ensure that all mechanical and electrical equipment is regularly services and made fit for purpose. All required safety equipment should be on board before venturing out onto the water.



This information is from previously approved responses and has been approved by DDG(IMD).

Response (please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

The managed motorway initiatives on the Bruce Highway were implemented in September 2015 and March 2016. These include variable speed limits (VSL) and ramp metering, to improve road safety, traffic flow and manage congestion.

The signs were installed because of the existing and increasing levels of congestion on the Bruce Highway, and to address the crash rate.

Live traffic conditions are monitored via in-pavement vehicle detectors and traffic Closed Circuit TV Cameras (CCTV), and changes to the speed limit are made as needed. If congestion occurs and vehicle speeds drop to below 50km/h, the signs will reduce the speed limit to 60kp/h. The VSL signs have been installed as a safety measure to reduce the risk of rear-end crashes on this highly-trafficked section of the Bruce Highway.

These signs activate during the AM peak period when congestion is occurring, bad weather is experienced or there is an incident on the highway. The signs do not operate when conditions on the highway are free-flowing.

The ramp metering signals activate automatically by the in-pavement vehicle detectors when the queue of traffic reaches a certain point. This initiative manages the rate at which vehicles are allowed to enter the motorway.

Similar technology has been implemented on:

- Ted Smout Bridge/Houghton Highway
- Ipswich Motorway between Dinmore and Darra
- Port of Brisbane Motorway from Gateway Motorway to Lytton
- Centenary Motorway from Richlands to Jindalee
- Western Freeway at Toowong/Auchenflower
- Sunshine Motorway at Sippy Downs
- Pacific Motorway inbound from Loganlea Road to Juliet Street

Since the implementation of Bruce Highway camp metering system motorists have experienced savings in travel time.

- Post implementation of the ramp metering system along the Bruce Highway (southbound between Caboolture and the Gateway Motorway)
 - o the average AM Peak (6am-9am) travel time on the Bruce Highway from Caboolture Interchange to Pine River Bridge **decreased** by **2 minutes** (down from an average of 21 minutes in 2015 to 19 minutes in 2017).
- However, the traffic growth, over the same period (that is, the average daily vehicle-kilometre-travelled (VKT) along this route increased by 5% per annum)
 - o (VKT is a measure of the traffic demand on the road network)
- Please note, since implementation of the Bruce Highway ramp metering system, the daily congestion cost was reduced by 26% on a typical weekday.
 - o The travel time reliability cost also dropped by 7%.

Oxley Road underpass works

We are unaware of any funding requests to Brisbane City Council (BCC) regarding Oxley Road. Oxley Road is a BCC responsibility.

Oxley Creek Interchange

We are currently upgrading the eastern end of the Ipswich Motorway between Rocklea and Darra in a staged approach, reducing traffic and delivering value for money on one of Queensland's major motorways.

The Rocklea to Darra - Stage 1 project covers a three-kilometre section of the Ipswich Motorway from Granard Road, Rocklea to just east of the Oxley Road Interchange, Oxley. This was identified as the next most critical section of the remaining seven kilometres of the Ipswich Motorway still to be upgraded.

In 2012, the preferred upgrade option was released. This option forms part of the master plan to finish the full 19-kilometre upgrade of the Ipswich Motorway and will tie into already completed upgrades in the western corridor.

The preferred design also includes the Oxley Road interchange and the remaining four kilometres of the Ipswich Motorway to the Centenary Motorway. This upgrade option was released as a concept only.

Detailed design will not start until funding has been secured and a contract awarded. The need for upgrading this remaining section of the Ipswich Motorway is recognised, however, like all projects, further stages are subject to statewide priorities and the availability of funds. At this stage, there has been no funding committed.

Moggill District Sports Ground complex footpath connection

The State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA) forwarded the Moggill District Sports Park development application to Transport and Main Roads (TMR) for technical advice.

TMR and SARA did not include conditions for a footpath, as would often be the case, as there is no surrounding footpath to connect to or a nearby bus stop for public transport connections.

Given the rural nature of the area and lack of nearby public transport, the developer would expect most users of the new sports park facility will be accessing the site by road.

Moggill District Sports Ground complex bus extension

TransLink continues to work with Brisbane City Council to ensure services meet the needs of the local community.

One of the key factors in introducing any future services is customer demand, in this case the demand for services to the Moggill Sports Ground is predicted to be low, particularly across a full day.

In addition, a change in route to service the sports ground would require significant infrastructure upgrades to allow buses to safely turn around in the area.

As such, there are no plans to change the current services in this part of the network at this stage.

However, TransLink recognises the needs of communities change over time and will continue to monitor the performance of the network to ensure it is providing efficient and reliable services and infrastructure that meet the needs of the broader community.

Planning is currently underway for the 36.5km Coomera Connector which runs between Stapylton-Jacobs Well Road at Staplyton and Nerang-Broadbeach Road in Nerang. This will identify the need for the project, what form the transport corridor may take and the potential staging.

The strategic cost estimate of \$2.4 billion for Stage 1 of the project from Coomera to Helensvale was based on a cost \$/kilometre for road, and \$/kilometre for bridge of the gazetted alignment. This is an estimated value based on existing costings for the current M1 projects and may change during the planning process.

The costing includes only the current gazetted corridor.

It is too early in the planning to nominate a section of the corridor that may be built first and it will depend on future traffic growth and availability of funding.

We worked with Redlands City Council to investigate what operational benefits could be gained at the Cleveland intersection within the available federal government funding.

The installation of pedestrian signals was investigated in a location that did not interfere with local business accesses, the operation of the roundabout or bus stops.

The most suitable location identified was not close to the Shore and Wellington Street intersection meaning pedestrians would be less likely to use the facility.

Due to this, both departmental and council officers decided not to continue to pursue this investigation any further.

We also completed a planning study in 2015 which looked a possible upgrade to the Shore Street West and Wellington Street intersection. The study identified the traffic distribution was relatively even across all legs of the roundabout and adequate for traffic. No particular safety issues were identified.

While the roundabout traffic may have increased due to development and growth recently, it is still operating adequately with no particular increase in safety issues.

The safety of road users is the our number one priority. We can advise that the condition of Forest Hill-Fernvale Road is regularly monitored for safety and to identify maintenance requirements.

We will spend \$2.1 million rehabilitating Forest Hill-Fernvale Road from Reinbotts Road to Haslingden Park Drive and from Church Street to Station Street, Lowood in 2019 with the exact construction timing yet to be determined.

Community feedback is important and we investigate all concerns raised.

Upgrades to the state-controlled road network are prioritised to ensure funding is allocated to those works identified as being needed the most. When deciding where funding is spent, criteria such as traffic volumes, road geometry, the condition of the road and the crash record are all considered.

We are working closely with the Queensland Police Service in investigating the fatal crash that occurred on Forest Hill-Fernvale Road on 6 July.

It is standard procedure for TMR to investigate all fatalities on the state-controlled road network and we are looking into factors such as prevailing weather conditions, road design and visibility.



We have completed community consultation for the Northern Bikeway stages 2, 3A, 3B and 3C which started in 2015.

This consultation was based on the Brisbane City Council-endorsed concept design and included:

- direct letterbox drops,
- door knocking of local businesses and community groups,
- establishment of a dedicated phone line,
- o posting flyers and maps along the route of the bikeway, and
- briefing elected representatives.

Recently we completed detailed design for stages 2 and 3 and submitted it to council for endorsement in January. We are working closely with council to finalise its input. Once approved, the finalised design will be released to the public.

We are not selling public land as part of the North Brisbane Bikeway (NBB). To minimise the loss of on-street parking, the design for Stages 2, 3B and 3C has only 300m of on-road bikeway and 1.2km of off-road bikeway.

The merits of an off-road option using state land, versus repurposing the road space along Mawarra Street were discussed at length with council officers before being agreed to by council.

The NBB cannot be built on the rail corridor at this location due to safety concerns and site restrictions.







This sign is not about preventing dolphin-watching, fishing or other activities in this area, it's about the safety of boat operators, the community and dolphins.

It is important the movement of people and vessels is not impeded on the boat ramp or floating walkway. We do take safety seriously because very simple things can quickly lead to more serious issues when power boats are involved – that's why the penalty is significant.

Also for the safety of dolphins, we do not want them attracted to the boat ramp in search of food and risk them being hit by a vessel.

There are ample opportunities for people to conduct non-boating activities at beautiful Tin Can Bay.

We welcome this opportunity to remind people of why they shouldn't be on the walkway if they're not immediately engaged with embarking or disembarking.

About 750 people attended the four drop in information sessions held for Stage 3 of the Gold Coast Light Rail. It was voluntary registration so not all attendees chose to register.

We received 169 written submissions at these drop in sessions.

More than 2000 people visited <u>www.gclr3a.com.au</u> with about half choosing to complete the survey. Majority of this feedback was positive.

Colmar Brunton undertook independent market research with 540 participants and 25,000 project newsletters were delivered direct to letterboxes.

Online survey

From 1 to 31 August, the GCLR3A website hosting the online survey was visited by more than 2000 people, with about half choosing not to complete the survey and the majority of respondents providing positive feedback.

58 per cent of respondents were in support or not against the light rail extension. Of those not supportive, a number of these respondents noted the future extension Stage 3B south of Burleigh Heads as their main concern.

Residents from across the Gold Coast responded to the survey. The highest number of respondents were from Burleigh and Palm Beach with support split equally in these suburbs.

The overall findings are generally consistent with the outcomes of the survey conducted by City of Gold Coast in 2017 that found the majority of people supported light rail.

Market research

To complement the online survey, the government also undertook independent market research of residents in the Stage 3A corridor and along the current G:Link alignment.

Stage 1 focused on a quantitative process of a telephone survey involving 500 participants consisting of:

- 100 residents in the current stretch of the GCLR
- 300 residents in the Stage 3A corridor
- 100 businesses whose premises (re) in the Stage 3A corridor

Stage 2 focused on a qualitative process involving four focus groups of eight participants including residents in the current GCLR corridor, residents in the Stage 3A corridor and businesses in the Stage 3A corridor.

The market research found

- Gold Coast residents
 - 86 per cent support Stage 3A
- Corridor residents
 - 72 per cent support Stage 3A
- Corridor businesses
 - 80 per cent support Stage 3A



We are aware the Mount Glorious Road and School Road intersection experiences congestion during the peak school pick up and drop off times.

Funding for any upgrade is allocated on a priority basis across the state. Priorities are determined by considering site-specific parameters such as crash history, traffic volumes, geometry and visibility.

We have reviewed crash data for this intersection which shows a low crash history.

This intersection is also located on a straight section of Mount Glorious Road in a low speed environment of 60km/h.

Given these factors, an upgrade is not a high priority and we currently have no plans or funding to improve this intersection.

We will continue to monitor safety and traffic flow at this location.



For your information only, we've received another media enquiry from the Minister's office about the Shore St West/Wellington Street roundabout at Cleveland.

We provided a response late last week (see below) that we will resend to the Minister's office.

Response (please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

We also completed a planning study in 2015 which looked a possible upgrade to the Shore Street West and Wellington Street intersection. The study identified the traffic distribution was relatively even across all legs of the roundabout and adequate for traffic. No particular safety issues were identified.

While the roundabout traffic may have increased due to development and growth recently, it is still operating adequately with no particular increase in safety issues.

We worked with Redlands City Council to investigate what operational benefits could be gained at the Cleveland intersection within the available federal government funding.

The installation of pedestrian signals was investigated in a location that did not interfere with local business accesses, the operation of the roundabout or bus stops.

The most suitable location identified was not close to the Shore and Wellington Street intersection meaning pedestrians would be less likely to use the facility.

Due to this, both departmental and council officers decided not to continue to pursue this investigation any further.



Towing Industry Investigation

In May 2017, in response to growing community concern over unfair and intimidatory practices around the removal of vehicles parked on private property, the Queensland Government commissioned retired District Court Judge, Mr Michael Forde, to lead an independent investigation to examine the tow truck and vehicle removal industry. The investigation considered the rights of private property owners and occupiers to manage their parking areas, including removing vehicles parked on their property, as well as motorists' rights to maintain possession of their vehicle. The investigation received 41 submissions from individuals and organisations on this issue, in addition to 368 people who provided details to the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) Tow Truck Hotline on their experiences, concerns and suggestions for improvement. The investigation report was released on 6 August 2017, making 22 recommendations for improvement to the towing industry and providing an additional eight matters for further consideration regarding broader issues in the tow truck legislation to be considered when reviewing the tow truck legislation over the next two years. The Queensland Government accepted all recommendations and matters for further consideration made by the independent investigation. These reforms, as well as those that may result from a broader review, aim to promote fair, reasonable and professional towing services and improving Queenslanders' awareness of their rights and obligations in telation to private property parking and towing. The Tow Truck and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2018 was passed on 8 March 2018. The new arrangements commenced operation on 16 April 2018. The new laws impose requirements such as licensing and accreditation, suitability checking, conduct requirements of licence and accreditation holders and maximum standard tow fees. TMR Transport Inspectors and the Queensland Police Service, investigate complaints where a breach of the tow truck legislation may have occurred. Transport Inspectors additionally undertake compliance activities in respect of licensed tow truck operators and drivers to ensure they are complying with legislation. Over the next two years TMR will conduct a broader review of the tow truck legislation to ensure it is meeting the policy objectives. 



ENQUIRY

We have been contacted by parents complaining there are no pedestrian crossings around both primary and secondary state schools at Pimpama, namely along Dixon Rd. The concerns have followed an incident where a 12-year-old boy had his leg runover by a car yesterday.

Can I please get a comment from the department about why there is not pedestrian crossings around the schools and what efforts have been made to instal some?

Also, according to the parents there have been requests from the schools to install pedestrian crossings. Can I please find out if there have been requests?

The result of those requests and if there are future plans to install pedestrian crossings.

I am writing the story for tomorrow's Gold Coast Bulletin so can I please get a response today?

RESPONSE (Please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson):

TMR road safety staff are included in the consultation process for all new schools to provide advice on plans, but not the road environment.

We provide input at the Proposed Infrastructure Designation application stage of a proposed school to identify planning and traffic issues.

The decision to take these suggestions on board sits with the DA owner.

On 15 March 2018, the Pimpama State School principal completed an application for a supervised crossing.

On 21 June at a Safe School Travel (SafeST) Committee meeting, a senior TMR road safety advisor informed the committee of the outcome of a risk assessment conducted at both Dixon Drive and Charles Avenue.

They advised the school they would be placed on a state-wide priority list awaiting future funding.

A SafeST Committee representative from the City of Gold Coast advised local funding to install the crossing on Dixon Drive will be sourced, however funding needs to be sourced to provide paid supervisors to man the crossing.

As budget does not currently exist to provide paid supervision, the school was provided with an alternative option to have volunteers work at the crossing (who would be trained by TMR to ensure safe road crossing practices) or support a school paid supervisor position.

As Dixon Drive is managed by the City of Gold Coast Council, the council had indicated it will install the infrastructure for a dual children's crossing, not a pedestrian crossing.

The request for a TMR funded crossing has been accepted and placed on a state-wide priority funding list.

ENDS

Department of Education Response:

The safety of students and staff is the highest priority for Queensland state schools and the Department of Education.

The Department encourages all drivers and pedestrians near state schools to exercise caution and patience in the interests of safety, especially during peak periods.

Traffic, roads and crossings are the responsibility of local councils and the Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR).

Like all state schools, Pimpama State Primary College has a strong focus on student behaviour and safety, and as part of this emphasis, road safety is regularly highlighted.

Safe practices are frequently promoted to students, parents and the wider community through newsletters and Parents and Citizens Association meetings.

The Department will continue to work with the school community and local authorities to address this important issue, through the SafeST committee which is coordinated by DTMR.

City's response:

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) is responsible for identifying the need for children's crossings at schools and have recently undertaken an audit in Pimpama. As a priority the City is

investigating the implementation of some kerbside management measures and a pedestrian refuge facility adjacent to the high school to improve local road safety. In line with the City's Road Safety Plan 2015 – 2020 we continue to work with the Queensland Police Service and TMR to encourage safe driver, cyclist and pedestrian behaviour within close proximity to schools.

Wheels to turn on bus stop upgrades for Kippa-Ring

Kippa-Ring commuters will soon enjoy improved accessibility and upgraded infrastructure with a \$1.9 million bus stop upgrade design now complete and work underway.

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the project would provide improved access at three modern bus stops for Anzac Avenue commuters outside the Peninsula Fair Shopping Centre.

"The State Government is committed to improving passenger transport infrastructure to deliver a better network that is more appealing to use," Mr Bailey said.

"The upgraded bus stops will give customers a safer and more comfortable place to get on board routes 660, 680, 694 and 696.

"We have seen an increase in commuters using bus stops located on Anzac Avenue near to the shopping centre.

"We listened to the community's feedback about the lack of seats and shelter at the bus stops and we are now delivering this important upgrade."

Mr Bailey said key improvements include relocating the eastbound and westbound stops to provide additional bus and passenger capacity and upgrading stops B and C to premium bus stops with large shelters.

"An additional shelter will be built at the eastbound stop, about 50m west of the existing bus stop, to cater for a local bus service, 694, that turns right into Kappella Street," he said.

Mr Bailey said construction started in early June and was anticipated to take up to 12 weeks to complete, weather permitting.

"Due to the high traffic volumes on Anzac Avenue, it will be necessary to undertake a majority of the works at night or on weekends," he said.

"For the safety of pedestrians, road workers and motorists, changed traffic conditions, including intermittent lane closures, speed reductions and traffic control will be in place.

"I would like to thank the community for its patience while this important upgrade is completed."





Design works started on the Sumners Road Interchange Upgrade (SRIU) in February with pre-construction activities expected to start on site in late 2018.

The SRIU project will replace the two roundabouts with signalised intersections and build a second eastbound bridge.

These upgrades have several benefits including;

- controlling traffic movements and providing a safe crossing point for pedestrians and cyclists
- increased reliability, capacity and efficiency through the intersection
- synchronising traffic signal phases to cater for increased traffic passing through the interchange.

Signalised intersections rather than roundabouts are the preferred option for the Sumners Road interchange to control traffic movements and provide a safe crossing point for pedestrians and cyclists.

The signalised intersection will also be phased to optimise traffic efficiency at peak times.

They will also improve safety and reduce travel times for motorists in the Centenary suburbs, Ipswich and Springfield.



A \$1.9 million upgrade is currently underway to the Kippa Ring bus station to improve access at three stops on Anzac Avenue outside the Peninsula Fair Shopping Centre.

These upgrades will improve passenger transport infrastructure to deliver a better network which is more appealing to use for commuters on routes 660, 680, 694 and 696.

Key improvements include relocating the eastbound and westbound stops to provide additional bus and passenger capacity and upgrade stop B and C to premium bus stops with large shelters.

Increasing capacity at these stops will allow for quicker drop-off and pick-up times, and improved on-time running.

An additional shelter will be built at the eastbound stop, about 50m west of the existing bus stop, to cater for a local bus service, 694, that turns right into Kappella Street.

Works started in early June and are expected to take up to 12 weeks to complete, weather permitting.





This agreement states operations and maintenance responsibility of the NSW section of the bypass (including the bypass tunnel) will be the responsibility of TMR from 3 June 2008 and return to RMS 10 years from opening (12:01am on 3 June 2018).

The bypass is seven kilometres in total with approximately four kilometres of the bypass in New South Wales including the 334 metre tunnel.

The volume of vehicles utilising this stretch of road has increased by 25 per cent since opening in 2008, with more than 57,000 vehicles per day using the bypass during 2017.

 Responsibility for the Tugun Bypass (New South Wales (NSW) section), including the Tugun Tunnel, will transfer from the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) to Roads and Maritime Services (RMS), NSW at midnight on 3 June 2018. • The Tugun Bypass is a 7.3 kilometre motorway that connects directly onto the Pacific Motorway between the Stewart Road Interchange at Tugun Queensland, and the Tweed Heads Bypass, north of Kennedy Drive, Tweed Heads, NSW. The Tugan bypass incorporates a 334 metre-long tunnel running under the southern end of the Gold Coast Airport's main runway. The NSW section of the Tugun Bypass is approximately four kilometres long.

Background

- The Tugun Bypass crosses the Queensland and NSW border and was opened on 3 June 2008.
- Given the joint responsibility for the project at the time, TMR and RMS entered into an Interstate Project Agreement (the agreement). The agreement is that operations and maintenance responsibility of the NSW section of the bypass (including the bypass tunnel) will be the responsibility of TMR from 3 June 2008 and return to RMS 10 years from opening (midnight on 3 June 2018).
- As the tunnel is located in NSW, the tunnel and tunnel associated infrastructure (including equipment and infrastructure located in Queensland) will be handed to RMS to maintain and operate.

Issues and Suggested Approach

• It has been communicated that the expectation is that RMS continue the current level of service for operations throughout the Tugun Bypass after handover.

Financial Implications

Response: (Please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson)

We aim to strike a balance between all transport modes including public transport, pedestrians and bike riders.

It is a general practice for state-controlled roads in Brisbane to not use automated crossings (that is, the practice of automatically calling up a pedestrian movement every cycle).

The only notable exception is the intersection of Mains and Kessels Roads at Nathan which runs an automatic pedestrian call-up during special events at QSAC stadium.

The cycle time for this intersection ranges between 130 and 150 seconds. Therefore the maximum pedestrian wait time to cross one leg of the intersection would be less than two minutes.

We consider many factors in determining signal cycle times including pedestrian wait times.

In order to reduce wait times for pedestrians, the cycle time of the signals for motorists would need to be lowered.

This in turn would mean the capacity of the intersection would be lowered and could therefore worsen congestion.

Intersections on state-controlled roads tend to have relatively lower pedestrian usage and therefore need to take the relatively high vehicle usage into account.

Pedestrian wait time can vary depending on location and times of day.

High pedestrian use intersections within Brisbane are mostly under the jurisdiction and operational control of Brisbane City Council.

My name is Naaman and I'm a reporter for the Guardian Australia. I hope this email finds you well.

I'm writing an article today about pedestrian crossings and whether or not they are automated, and was wondering if I could get the latest information on crossings in Brisbane?

I note <u>a 2014 article by news.com.au</u> reported that some of Queensland's pedestrian crossings were automated during busy pedestrian times.

Questions:

- What areas of Brisbane have automated crossings, and for what time periods in the day?
- How long is the average pedestrian wait time for automated crossings?

Our guidelines allow school zones to be installed on roads outside schools where they are readily visible to motorists and there is significant school-related activity on or beside the road.

If school zones were applied to roads with little or no school related activity and/or with no school visible from the road, their purpose would be less or wious and, over time, vehicle speeds would likely increase.

Junction Park State School fronts Waldheim and Gowrie streets. It is not visible from Ipswich Road.

Waldheim and Gowrie streets both have school zones and supervised school crossings.

Waldheim Street has flashing school zone signs and Gowrie Street has been approved for flashing school zone signs. These are to be installed by mid 2019.

We will continue to work with the Junction Park school community and Brisbane City Council to address road safety issues and concerns.



We have been talking with residents since late 2016 regarding concerns about safety at the Caloundra Road and Ridgewood Road intersection.

Following the outcomes from a community meeting in July 2017, we committed to investigate the suitability of traffic signals.

We wrote to residents in April this year to advise the investigation was complete and traffic signals at the Caloundra Road and Ridgewood Road intersection were found to be a suitable solution.

An upgrade to this intersection is currently being considered under our Targeted Road Safety Program (TRSP). This state funded program aims to improve the safety of the state-controlled road network through the implementation of high-benefit, cost-effective, safety treatments.

An upgrade to Caloundra Road and Ridgewood Road intersection to include traffic signals will need to compete against other road safety projects across the state for allocation of funding.

We have identified \$55 million in the Queensland Transport and Roads Investment Program (QTRIP) for the Cunningham Highway between Yamanto to Ebenezer in 2020-21 to 202122. Any funding identified in the years beyond the program will compete against statewide priorities.

In the interim, we appreciate concerns raised about safety at this location and will investigate safety solutions at the intersection of Ipswich-Rosewood Road and the Cunningham Highway.

Background – not for release

The Federal Government has committed up to \$170 million to upgrade the Cunningham Highway between Yamanto and Ebenezer Creek. This would be part of a 50/50 funding contribution with the State Government.

A business case for Cunningham Highway (Yamanto to Ebenezer) Upgrade project (CHYE) was undertaken in 2012 to address the significant increase in vehicle movements expected as a result of developments at the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) Base at Amberley, and the economic development opportunities occurring in the area.

We have recently undertaken a review of the economic and transport modelling completed for the 2012 business case. The review noted that, while over the last five years some RAAF development works had progressed, many have not. Also, the anticipated uptake of economic development in Amberley had not occurred in accordance with the assumptions used in the 2012 business case.

This has resulted in the need to re-examine priorities on the Cunningham Highway.

While upgrading the Cunningham Highway remains a priority, we will soon start a review of the national and state road corridors in Ipswich and west Brisbane to ascertain the area's needs and highest priorities. This study is expected to take about one year to complete. Once completed, CHYE will be compared and prioritised against other critical transport infrastructure needs in the area.





In January, we implemented a 40km/h school zone speed limit on Anzac Avenue fronting the Hercules Road State School.

The flashing school zone signs alert motorists to the new 40km/h school zone speed limit with operating times from 7am to 9am and 2pm to 4pm. These remind drivers to reduce their speeds. There is a signalised pedestrian crossing in place to assist pedestrians to safely cross the road.

Since the school zone was implemented, there have been no recorded crashes involving pedestrians. Any concerns about breaches of the road rules or dangerous driving should be referred to the Queensland Police Service.

Funding for infrastructure is allocated in accordance with state-wide priorities. We currently have no funding to install a pedestrian overpass across Anzac Avenue. We will continue to monitor safety at this location and undertake future assessments as required.

What is the criteria or prerequisites for TMR to consider and overpass there?

Has TMR assessed whether the school zone is safe since it installed the flashing lights earlier this year?

If so, what were the findings?

Could you please get a response to me by EOD.

Please find following a response to a Toowoomba Chronicle enquiry to the Minister's office about incident numbers on Toowoomba Second Range Crossing.

This enquiry is based on a Question on Notice that isn't due to be tabled until 14 June. We have checked internally (CLLO, ES, DLO) who advised against responding to this enquiry before the QON is tabled. They said it would be considered 'unparliamentary'. They also said the MP who tabled the QON should be given the courtesy of the response first and the journo directed to the parliamentary website.

We pushed back on mins and advised we should not respond to this enquiry however they said they would still like a response. Another option was for the mins office to table this QON early but they

didn't want to do that. Mins advised that they would prefer to be on the front foot with this enquiry.

Are you happy for us to progress this?

Response:

Since construction began in April 2016, just under three million hours in total have been worked and almost 5000 workers inducted.

There have been 10 recordable injuries.

The project's Lost Time Injury Frequency Rate is in the range of 1 to 2 which is well below the industry average of 13.7 for Heavy and Civil Engineering projects.

The project is also approaching 700,000 hours worked since the last Lost Time Injury happened.

Nexus is required under its contract to ensure management of work health and safety is compliant with the provisions of the *Work Health and Safety Act (2011).*

Nexus has advised it has implemented all 51 recommendations from the independent audit of mobile plant and vehicle management in April this year, and is committed to continuous improvement.

We expect Nexus to continue to implement safety improvements and initiatives.

We continually monitor the state-controlled road network to identify and carry out maintenance to provide a safe environment for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists.

Regular maintenance is undertaken along Aberdare Street as part of our road maintenance program. Last financial year we undertook sweeping on this stretch of road six times.

We will be reinstating linemarking along Aberdare Street between Brisbane Road and the southbound onramp to Cunningham Highway. This is planned to be completed in September, weather permitting.

We have conducted a number of onsite investigations recently along Aberdare Street. These have taken place during the morning and afternoon peak periods and monitored key factors such as driver behaviour, traffic volume, the number of queued vehicles, as well as the available sight distance for motorists exiting Pottery Road. We were also able to confirm that the speed signs are clear, well placed and appropriate with the current speed limit set at 60 km/h.

To further improve safety at the Pottery Road intersection, we have recently removed vegetation either side of the intersection to provide motorists with an unobstructed view of approaching traffic. We also did a sweep of Aberdare Street last weekend to remove a significant amount of dust from the road surface and islands.

There is no recorded crash history along Aberdare Street for the last ten years, which indicates that the Pottery Road intersection is operating at an acceptable safety level. We currently have no plans to modify this intersection.

It is acknowledged that a percentage of motorists, including truck drivers, drive inappropriately and are the cause of concern for safety. In these instances, the most effective and immediate response is referral to Queensland Police Service for enforcement.





Hot Issues Brief - Mackay Trucking company fined \$10,000 while donating hay

Transport Inspectors are highly trained and play an important role in contributing to Safer Drivers, Safer Vehicles and Safer Roads. They make sure all vehicles using our network are compliant and therefore ensuring them, and other road users return home safely.

On 30 August, Norseve Pty Ltd was fined \$10,000 in the Rockhampton Magistrates Court for four chain of responsibility offences under the Heavy Vehicle National Law.

The defendant's heavy vehicle was intercepted by transport inspectors on 25 June 2017 with loads on both trailers exceeding the legal width limits and inadequate restraints.

When the vehicle was intercepted the transport inspectors were not advised that the hay was a donation.

A fine in the range of \$9,000 to \$10,000 was appropriate considering the maximum penalty was \$138,500.

We are currently working towards mirroring NSW's recently introduced 2.83m width allowances for the movement of fodder to drought declared areas.

This notice was not in place at the time of this offence, and regardless, the operator would still have been responsible for ensuring adequate restraints were in place.

Background

It is a significant issue in the heavy vehicle industry where drivers are pressured to commit offences. Consequently, drivers are often prosecuted whilst operators are not pursued. In this matter, following a thorough investigation it was possible to pursue the operator through chain of responsibility laws.

Further, as the delivery of the load was for a friend, there was no pressing commercial reason for the vehicle to be overloaded and poorly restrained. The load could have been moved within the limits of the law and without risking the safety of other road users.

The charges arose after the defendant's heavy vehicle was intercepted by transport inspectors on 25 June 2017.

The A-trailer was 11cm too wide, and the steel gates that should have been in place to restrain the load had been removed.

The B-trailer was 19cm too wide, and whilst some steel gates were in place, they had not been strapped over the top, so as to pull the gates in to vertical.

The driver told inspectors that he had refused to take the load of hay because it was not loaded legally, but his supervisor, and director of the company, had told him to take it anyway, and that he knew that it was not lawfully loaded.

Transport Inspectors have broad powers in relation to inspecting and examining vehicles, including heavy vehicles. They operate within strict guidelines and can issue on-the-spot fines for a range of offences. They can also report matters for court action.

Transport Inspectors have the authority to:

- intercept all vehicles to carry out safety inspections, check registration and compulsory third party insurance and check load restraints
- check heavy vehicle drivers' work diaries
- check passenger transport vehicles for drivers' authorisation and operator accreditation.

NSW introduced width allowances on 13 August for the movement of fodder to drought declared areas. That is, allowing up to 2.83 m in width under a National Notice. Load restraint requirements and other operating conditions, such as warning signs, will apply. We are working towards mirroring these.

This Notice is expected to be ready for road manager approval processes to be undertaken from mid-September 2018. This notice was not in place at the time of this offence.

If this notice was in place at the time of the intercept the additional width would be within the allowable limits. However, there are still specific restraint requirements associated with this increase in width. In this instance, poor restraint practices were also identified.

A development application for a service station and fast food outlet was referred to the State Assessment Referral Agency (SARA) as the responsible concurrence agency for the

development. SARA forms part of the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning (DSDMIP).

As the technical agency, we reviewed the application and provided recommendations to SARA.

Our technical review, while rigorous, is limited to the assessment of the safety and efficiency impacts the proposal has on the state-controlled road, Lower King Street.

Our assessment of the applicant's detailed traffic impact report recommended a left-in entry only from Lower King Street is required. All other access will be via local council's Mewett Street.

It also determined an upgrade to the intersection is not required as the nature of the development means it will be a "drop-in" convenience trip, rather than a destination trip.

As such, the development is not considered to significantly increase traffic volumes currently travelling through the intersection. Therefore, the condition of upgrades to the intersection were not considered to be warranted.

An independent expert, in consultation with the Department of Transport and Main Roads and its contractor, COLAS, has completed a review of the seal issues on Millaa Millaa-Malanda Road.

Most of the report's recommendations have already been implemented.

One of the changes we have made is to reduce the minimum temperature for Polymer modified binder spray seals to 25°C from 20°C.

TMR has a competitive open tender process for spray seal contracts.

In general, we receive tenders from across north Queensland.

Recent works have been awarded to companies from Cairns and Townsville.

Local practices on spray sealing contracts have been amended to reflect the local conditions experienced in the Tablelands region across June and July.

The first stage of the longer term remedial works on the Millaa Millaa-Malanda Road was completed in early August, with the final stage expected to be completed by early October.

In addition, the choice of bitumen polymer additives has been reviewed for spray seals in this location.

We will continue to work with COLAS to resolve this matter, in accordance with the terms of the contract.

We are committed to delivering congestion-reducing initiatives on the Bruce Highway between Brisbane and the Sunshine Coast. We are working to improve road and rail infrastructure to cater for the increasing demands.

An \$8 million planning project is being fast-tracked for the Bruce Highway between the Pine River and Caloundra Road interchange. The planning will prioritise upgrade works to increase safety, ease congestion and improve flood immunity.

We have completed the Detailed Business Case for the \$662.5 million six-laning of the Bruce Highway between Caboolture and Steve Irwin Way. Progressing detailed design is the current priority for this critical project, with construction expected to start in 2019/20.

Preliminary planning is continuing for the other two sections, Steve Irwin Way to Caloundra Road and Pine Rivers to Caboolture. This planning is expected to be completed later in 2018.

Works are currently underway on the \$812.95 million upgrade to the Bruce Highway between Caloundra Road and Sunshine Motorway. This upgrade will deliver critical safety benefits to motorists, improve efficiency and reduce traffic congestion and ensure the highway can cater for future traffic growth. Construction on this project is expected in late 2020.

Upgrading the Deception Bay Road interchange with the Bruce Highway has already been identified as a priority, with \$150 million allocated to fast-track the works.

In 2017, we completed construction of the \$100.4 million upgrade of the Boundary Road interchange with the Bruce Highway. This was finished six months ahead of schedule and included replacing the previous two-lane bridge with a new six-lane bridge to provide local commuters with safer, faster and more efficient access to and from the Bruce Highway.

We are also committed to the progressive priority upgrade of the North Coast line to improve its safety, efficiency and reliability. An important part of this upgrade is the Beerburrum to Nambour Upgrade project. This will double the number of rail passengers from north of Caboolture inbound to Brisbane, improve journey times and reliability and increase the number of services offered during peak times and will also remove some traffic from the Bruce Highway.



Last Friday, traffic at the Lowood-Minden Road, Tallegalla Road and Warrego Highway intersection was switched to a new alignment.

Motorists are now travelling on the new roadway as part of the Warrego Highway Safety Improvement Works (Lowood-Minden Road/Tallegalla Road Intersection) project.

In preparation for the switch, we installed linemarking, bollards, cones and signage to assist road users through the new arrangement.

Works are progressively being carried out in stages.

Final signs and line marking will be in place in coming months. In the meantime, motorists are advised to proceed through the job site with caution observing the direction of traffic controllers and signage.

We are monitoring the intersection and driver behaviour to identify if any improvements can be made.

The project will improve safety, ease congestion and increase capacity to cater for future traffic volumes.

It includes moving the bus stops away from the Warrego Highway to prevent buses and long vehicles overhanging into highway traffic when stopping.

Works at the intersection started late September 2017. They are expected to be completed this year, weather and construction conditions permitting, which is earlier than expected.



We manage the intersection of Gympie Road with Castle and Strathmore Street.

We had previously received many requests to add dedicated right-turn movements out of both Strathmore and Castle Streets on to Gympie Road.

These right-turn movements improve motorist safety by stopping cars having to make the right turn across oncoming traffic. It also improves pedestrian safety by reducing the number of cars turning across pedestrian green lights.

Before implementing the right turn we undertook an analysis of the intersection to model the most efficient operation with the adjusted configuration, while minimising disruption to the traffic flow of Gympie Road.

As a result, the pedestrian phase needed to be staged, with pedestrians waiting within the median of Gympie Road when crossing. There was insufficient room on the southern side of the intersection to allow for pedestrians to wait safely in the median, therefore the southern crossing had to be removed.

The Coles development had no bearing on the decision on where to place the pedestrian crossing across Gympie Road.

We will continue to monitor the intersection performance.

Our crews and maintenance contractors conduct regular patrols of the state-controlled network to identify potholes and road damage, undertaking repairs as necessary.

Potholes are caused by moisture entering and weakening a road's surface. Extended rain periods, as the Mackay and Proserpine region have experienced between February and April, mean potholing is sometimes unavoidable.

When a hazard is identified, our first response is to temporarily repair the road and make it safe for traffic. Depending on the cause of the road damage, there are several federal and state funding programs, including Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements, which may be available to complete permanent repairs.

With so many road users travelling Queensland's highways and state-controlled roads daily, it's inevitable some people will make use of our compensation claims process.

While we take a reasonable approach, assessing each claim on a case by case basis, we are not liable for damage or loss caused by a road hazard unless we are aware of the hazard and failed to fix it within a reasonable time.





Edmonton boat ramp facilities completed ahead of schedule

The Palaszczuk Government has delivered a \$685,000 floating walkway at Edmonton boat ramp ahead of schedule.

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the two lane boat ramp was widened to accommodate the installation of the new walkway.

"This addition to the boat ramp facility will improve access to the water and assist with any onwater congestion during busy periods," Mr Bailey said.

"It will also allow for faster and improved boat launching and retrieval operations and better access for children and the elderly.

"Works included the placement of grouted rock shoulders on the upstream side of the ramp, which will prevent erosion and prolong the life of the ramp."

Mr Bailey said the works had a strong focus on local jobs and materials.

"Queensland-based contractors Australian Marine and Civil along with The Jetty Specialists completed these works and employed locals to get the work done," he said.

"Local materials were used which is always a plus for North Queensland businesses."

"Other enhancements to the site included improved lighting and the relocation of power services, which will go a long way to improve safety for boaties using the facilities at night."

Mr Bailey thanked local boaties for their patience during construction.

This upgrade was funded by the Queensland Government's Marine Infrastructure Fund.



Response: (Please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson)

The proposed works are planned for the existing Clump Point boat ramp site, not at Perry Harvey jetty (Clump Point jetty). There will be no disruption to the Perry Harvey jetty site.

We are preparing tender documents to engage a construction contractor for the upgrade at the Clump Point boat ramp site.

The timing and duration of the works will be subject to the successful contractor's schedule.

We expect they may take between nine to 12 months to complete - the works may be undertaken in stages.

Works may possibly start later this year and finished in late 2019.

We have previously communicated that due to the site constraints, the boat ramp facility will have to be closed to the public/recreational boaties during construction.

Due to the impact, we will ensure works are completed as quickly as possible.

We are in discussions with commercial operators about the potential impacts and how some access may be available during the construction works.

Feedback received from operators will be applied to the construction tender process which will assist with the final works schedule.

The proposed facility upgrade represents a significant long-term benefit to the Mission Beach Community and some temporary inconvenience is unavoidable.

We intend to keep commercial operators and the wider community well informed as more detail on timing becomes available.

The Stafford Road and South Pine Road intersection upgrade project was developed to be delivered in two stages.

1

The first stage includes building a new link road from Stafford Road to South Pine Road, also known as the Everton Park Link Road.

This will relieve intersection congestion by providing an alternative route for some traffic movements.

Funding of \$26 million has been committed to complete this first stage.

The second stage will upgrade the existing Stafford Road and South Pine Road intersection.

Traffic modelling for the full upgrade was undertaken in 2012 during the business case phase. Updated modelling, particularly around the operation of the link road, is being undertaken as part of the detailed design phase. Detailed design is programmed to be completed mid 2019.

Everton Park Link Road has been designed to be integrated with the North West Transport Corridor. The North West Transport Corridor is an integrated transport corridor that is preserved for future walking, cycling, rail and road. There is currently no timeframe for its delivery.

Funding for future stages has not yet been committed and will need to compete against statewide priorities.

Since 2015, we have spent almost \$4 million in improvements to state boating infrastructure in the Mackay Regional Council area. We have also provided about \$1.2 million in grant funding for boating infrastructure in the Mackay region.

The all-tide boat ramps in the Mackay area include the four-lane boat ramp at Mackay Harbour, as well as Hay Point, River Street and the Victor Creek facilities.

In addition to the all-tide facilities in the Mackay Regional Council area, there are an additional three boat ramp facilities that are considered to be near-all tide facilities which are available for use about 80% of the time.

We are looking at options for minor improvements to the newly upgraded River Street boat ramp, and will keep locals informed as this progresses. Any improvements to the car-park facilities are the Mackay Regional Council's responsibility.

There are no plans to dredge around Bucasia boat ramp facility.

We are committed to providing ongoing improvements to recreational coating infrastructure for the Mackay region.

On the future program for 2018-19 and 2019-20, the Queensland Government's Marine Infrastructure Fund has allocated \$1.6 million in funding for a new boat ramp facility at Midge Point and also an upgrade to the existing Grasstree Beach boat ramp.

Hello Reuben Wylie here from the Daily Mercury in Mackay.

I'm chasing a Department response in regards to some complaints I have found from local anglers about Bucasia Boat Ramp and River Street Boat Ramp, and there being a 'low availability' of non-tidal Boat Ramps to launch larger boats over 4 meters at any given time in Mackay.

According to the anglers there are only 3 non tidal ramps to launch boats over 4 meters in Mackay including River Street Boat Ramp, VMR Boat Ramp at Hay Point and Constant Creek Boat Ramp in Seaforth.

Boaties have been complaining that they do not trust the River Street Boat Ramp because they claim the ramp is 'poorly aligned' and lacks a 'rock crib wall' to prevent the current running in and knocking the boats around as they try to launch or land around high tide on the Pioneer River.

Also there is some concern that the security at the River Street Boat Ramp carpark is poor and boaties don't want to leave their cars and trailers there at night.

I'm wondering if any works are planned to realign the River Street Boat Ramp and install a rock crib wall?

Also just wondering if any plans are underway with TMR for any new non 'tidal' boat ramps that can handle boats over 4 meters?

Also are any plans underway to dredge around the Bucasia Boat Ramp?

We provided the following information to the Courier Mail in late May.

Are you happy for me to provide the same information to Ch 9?

Response: (Please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson)

Traffic lights control the flow of vehicles and pedestrians to improve safety and access to roads.

You should drive at a speed that gives you time to react if the traffic lights change.

Motorists must stop on a yellow (amber) light, unless it is unsafe to do so.

Disobeying traffic lights can result in right angle crashes which are particularly dangerous for occupants because the sides of vehicles have less protection to absorb the impact force compared to the front and rear.

The yellow light is not the end of the green light phase, it is the beginning of the red light phase.

If it is safe to stop, you must not drive past the stop line at the yellow traffic light or, if there is no stop line, the traffic light.

If it is unsafe to stop, such as being close to the light when it changes from green to yellow, you may proceed through the yellow light within the posted speed limit.

New combined red light and speed camera technology detects motorists who disobey the red traffic light, as well as motorists who speed through the intersection.

If you go through a yellow or red traffic light when it was safe to stop, you may receive an infringement notice from either a police officer or in the mail for a camera-detected offence.

Hi Neil/Julie

For your information, we've been asked by mins for some extra information in relation to the Courier Mail request that we did last week.

The team have also added an extra line to the media enquiry (highlighted below).

We can advise the numbers calculated are correct.

FYI, bus services are calculated based on an average vehicle seated of 43 passengers per bus, and 364 passengers per train. These load factors are considered very conservative, which does not account for any upgrades to vehicle capacities (IE more articulated buses at a higher seated capacity and overall design capacity). TMR's future plans are to optimise service routes to be more efficient running less empty vehicles. That being said, there isn't a linear relationship between the number of passenger trips and the number of services. This is also evident in the rail service analysis, where the total number of seated capacity used was 364 compared to the current planning capacities of 450 seated and 750 design capacity (seated and standing). The aim is to reduce the un-used service capacity and to better utilise the fleet. Whilst we've used these figures to estimate the additional services, delivering them will be dependent on demand and the transport task which may alter the number of services needed for both bus and rail combined.

When I combine the two into one public transport figure (13,850 in 2018 and 26,800 in 2048) I'm getting a CAGR of 2.22%. Correct, these are consistent with SIP Part A (pages 16-17).

My worry is that a journo who gets these numbers will make the assumption that PT/service increases won't keep up with demand. There are two sets of capacity that are normally referred to, one being the service capacity and the other the network capacity. TMR plans for both, however service capacity is generally more flexible, meaning new services can be introduced depending on the demand. Network capacity is less flexible and cannot be increased without adding to the infrastructure. Therefore, it is not possible to make a direct comparison between number PT trips and PT services. Hence no changes to the suggested response. However we hope this provides the Mins office with more clarity.

Can we please get some clarification of these numbers before we give them out? It may be that I'm 1. I'm not doing the calculations correctly or 2. That I'm comparing apples with oranges, Calculations are correct but unfortunately apples and oranges are being compared.

Please find a following suggested response to Daryl Passmore Courier Mail re enquiry about projected population transport demands for Queensland. Please note DPC also has an interest in this one.

Questions

- 1. How many more vehicles are projected to be on the roads by 2048?
- 2. How many public transport passengers/journeys (rail and bus)?
- 3. How many new rail lines will be required, and where?
- 4. How many additional trains and buses?
- 5. Beyond Cross River Rail, what major transport infrastructure initiatives are planned to cope with that increased demand?
- 6. What new and emerging trends have been identified that will shape transport infrastructure and services by 2048?

Suggested response

The number of vehicles in Queensland is projected to increase from around 4 million in 2018 to 6.3 million in 2048, based on current ownership trends.

This equates to annual growth of 1.5 per cent compared to projected annual growth rate in the population of 1.6 per cent.

The number of daily public transport trips is projected to increase from around 550,000 trips per day in 2018 to 1.6 million trips per day in 2048.

This equates to an annual growth rate of 3.6 per cent.

The number of additional weekday public transport services is projected to increase from around 12,500 bus services per day in 2018 to 24,000 bus services per day in 2048.

Passenger rail services within south east Queensland are projected to increase from around 1,350 rail services per week day in 2018 to 2,800 rail services per week day in 2048. It is assumed that vehicle occupancy will improve therefore proportionally fewer services are required to deliver the increased passenger demand.

The Queensland Government is committed to revitalising and transforming south east Queensland's rail network so it can meet the challenges of a growing population and provide customers a high performing rail service.

South East Queensland's Rail Horizon outlines network solutions, including the Queensland Government's highest priority infrastructure project – Cross River Rail – which is core to this long-term rail network strategy.

Over the 25 year horizon, ShapingSEQ: South East Queensland Regional Plan 2017 has identified priority region-shaping infrastructure projects including:

- Cross River Rail
- Brisbane Metro
- South East Busway Extension to Springwood
- Eastern Busway extension to Carindale and Capalaba
- Northern Busway extension to Bracken Ridge
- Extending high frequency public transport connections from Browns Plains to South East Busway
- Frequent public transport to major expansion growth areas including Caboolture West and Yarrabilba
- Dedicated Freight Rail Corridor between Acacia Ridge and Port of Brisbane
- Ipswich to Springfield Public Transport Corridor
- Salisbury to Flagstone Passenger Rail corridor

The next 30 years will see Queensland's transport system changing significantly.

Automated vehicles, electric vehicles and significant opportunities for our transport system.

Many of these new services and technologies are still in their infancy and more are likely to emerge over the next 30 years.

Transport and Main Roads is developing the Queensland Transport Strategy – a long-term strategy that will position Queensland's transport system to benefit from the opportunities from these changes and foster the right environment to address the challenges.

Modelling commissioned by the department suggests that the combination of automated vehicles and shared transport services has the potential to significantly improve Queensland's transport.

Journeys are likely to be safer, more efficient and more convenient.

The convergence of automated vehicles and shared transport also presents opportunities to manage congestion, by making better use of existing road capacity and the vehicles on those roads.








Questions

1. Is the \$100,000 for the cameras new funding? Where has it been allocated from?

- 2. When will the new cameras come into effect?
- 3. The press release mentions Maritime Safety Queensland has issued 12 infringement notices since implementing cameras that capture long distances when did these cameras come into effect? What timeframe were the 12 notices given in? What were these issued for?

Also, the release mentions tow-in jet skis just wanted to confirm is this surfing using a jet ski?

Suggested response

The funding for the cameras comes from the Gold Coast Waterways Authority's waterways project budget which is a rolling four-year program of funding annually reviewed.

The GCWA is now going through a procurement process with several potential suppliers. A launch date is yet to determined.

Maritime Safety Queensland marine enforcement officers in uniform began operating the new camera from March 15 with marine infringement notices issued for marine safety breaches such as operating too close to others in the water or not carrying required safety equipment,

The camera was used in days where big surf was occurring as a result of cyclonic conditions off the coast and future operations will also be subject to conditions which attract tow-in surfing activities.

As per the advice in MSQ's Tow in code of conduct documents

For the purpose of this code of conduct, tow-in surfing includes all of the following activities:

- towing a person (such as a surfer) using aquatic equipment behind a personal watercraft or recreational power craft (for example, rigid inflatable) until release at a position and speed that allows the person to catch a wave.
- the use of a recreational power craft to closely follow a person using aquatic equipment on a wave and retrieving the person after the ride, especially when surfing waves
- using a recreational power craft as a launch platform by a person jumping from the craft onto a wave using aquatic equipment.

There are a number of variations associated with tow-in surfing.

Put simply, if a recreational power craft is being used in connection with aquatic equipment in or near a surf zone, then this activity is considered as tow-in surfing.



A fishing trawler grounded at the mouth of the Mooloolah River about 6.00am today while attempting to depart Mooloolaba.

It was towed into deeper water by a pilot launch and returned to Mooloolaba.

There were no injuries and no damage was sustained by any vessel.

Maritime Safety Queensland is aware of the incident and is investigating.

The Mooloolah river mouth is affected by sand shoaling and dredging is presently underway.

We always encourage mariners to exercise extreme caution when entering the channel.



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

I am looking at getting a statement on the best way to extinguish a fire on a boat without a fire extinguisher.

We are running a story on a man who used a jetski to put out a fire. Is this a safe practise?

Suggested response

All registered Queensland regulated ships and boats more than five metres in length must carry firefighting equipment to extinguish a fire quickly and effectively.

However having the right safety equipment on any boat and knowing how to use it is essential to save your life in an emergency.

To comply with your general safety obligation you should carry the appropriate safety equipment which includes appropriate firefighting equipment.

For example a yacht that does not require registration isn't required by regulation to carry firefighting equipment but clearly a responsible skipper would ensure the galley had

a fire blanket to smother cooking fires and an appropriate extinguisher for any other fires above or below decks.

On smaller craft a bailing bucket could be an effective firefighting asset.

With regard to responding to shoreline fires the Queensland Fire and Emergency Service would be the appropriate agency to provide advice.

Queensland's graduated licensing scheme incorporates mandatory supervised driving experience and incentives for novice drivers to undertake driving lessons with accredited driver trainers, to ensure new drivers are getting the best start to their driving journey.

For these reasons, we are not currently considering introducing defensive driver training as a compulsory requirement to obtain a licence.

Most drivers develop additional skills which are more important for day-to-day driving, such as hazard perception and the ability to manage distractions, through experience and practice.

The best learning environment for a novice driver is on-road and under the direction of an experienced driver or professional driver trainer.

The use of mandatory hours of practice for novice drivers, professional on-road driving instruction by accredited driver trainers, and supervised driving practice in a wide variety of on-road situations, are generally more beneficial to novice drivers than undertaking defensive driving courses conducted in limited road environments.

The Mackay Daily Mercury has made an enquiry with minister's office re future proofing the Bruce Highway

Questions and suggested response as follows.

Questions

Could I please get more details in this part of the plan, in particular the rest areas? (Bruce Highway Safety Package, including pavement widening, safety barriers, and rest areas \$1.22 billion).

How important are more rest areas being built along the Bruce Hwy in the 15-year plan and are there any plans for more rest stops built in the immediate future?

How many designated driver reviver sites there are between Rockhampton and Townsville. Does the minister believe more rest areas are needed to reduce fatigue-related deaths along the Bruce Hwy in Queensland to bring us into line with other states?

The plan also mentions potential candidate projects in a number of our areas, including Improving the Bruce's flood resilience —
Is this upgrade (Goorganga Plains, near Proserpine) still one of the priority projects, and would this candidate project likely be under way in the immediate future?

What would this candidate project look like to improve safety along the Bruce Highway between Mackay and Sarina?

Suggested response

The Australian and Queensiand Governments have committed to a ten-year (2013-14 to 2022-23), \$8.5 billion program of works to upgrade the Bruce Highway, with a focus on improving safety, flood resilience and capacity.

The Australian Government has committed \$6.7 billion and the Queensland Government has committed \$1.8 billion to this vitally important program of works.

There are four Driver Reviver sites on the Bruce Highway between Rockhampton and Townsville at Yaamba, Waverley Creek, Bowen and Ayr.

There are 29 other Driver Reviver sites at strategic locations on the Queensland road network, including sites along the Bruce Highway at Chevallum, Gunalda, Maryborough and Gin Gin.

Rest areas are locations where all road users can stop their vehicles and achieve effective rest, supporting safer road use.

These include heavy vehicle rest areas, driver reviver sites, service centres and stopping bays.

From St. Lawrence to Mackay there are 34 stopping locations including six with facilities.

From Mackay to Proserpine there are 38 stopping locations including 12 with facilities.

From Proserpine to Bowen there are 11 stopping locations, four with facilities.

From Bowen to Ayr there are 26 stopping locations including nine with facilities.

From Ayr to Townsville there are 13 stopping locations including seven with facilities.

As part of the Bruce Highway program the Australian and Queensland Governments have committed \$15 million to plan and preserve the corridor for the potential future Goorganga Plains project on an 80-20 funding basis.

Any future funding the construction of an upgrade of the Bruce Highway at Goorganga Plains would be assessed against competing statewide priorities.

Safety works between the Mackay and Sarina section will be prioritised based on analysis of safety incidents, including specific requirements.

The aim is to deliver multiple treatment types, where practical, to maximise the safety outcomes.

The type of safety treatments to be considered include safer roadsides, including removing hazards, flattening side slopes and shielding hazards such as poles and culverts with safety barrier, wide centre line treatments, wider shoulders and overtaking lanes, safer intersections, such as additional right turn lanes on high speed rural sections.

This government is committed to working with the Australian Government to gain its agreement to investing \$1 billion annually on the Bruce Highway, based on 80:20 federal-state funding arrangements.





Maritime Safety Queensland's priority is to protect the state's waterways and the people who use them, providing safer, cleaner seas.

We expect the vessel to be refloated today when we can then determine the exact amount of diesel on board which is believed to be minimal.

Our marine officers responded immediately to the incident placing booms around the vessel to prevent further fuel discharge.

Because diesel is a non-persistent light oil which readily disperses and evaporates on exposure to sun and wave action, it is not expected to have any long-term environmental impact.

We are working closely with state and commonwealth agencies to complete the clean-up, refloat and remove the vessel over the next few days.

MSQ officers and QPWS indigenous rangers are moving shoreline debris above the high water mark for disposal.

The Type 1 Road Train access permits in 2017 were initially issued for six months to align with the abattoir and industry closure over the Christmas period.

Operators can now apply for a 12-month permit for Type 1 Road Trains to access the North Rockhampton abattoirs by contacting the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (www.nhvr.gov.au).

Background

Type 1 road train access, between the Central Queensland Livestock Exchange and Rockhampton abattoirs, started on 1 July 2017.

Operators using road train configurations through Rockhampton must hold a permit, which is issued by the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator.

The permit outlines specific conditions relating to the approved route (Neville Hewitt Bridge) and hours of operation (7pm-7am).

Transport and Main Roads consulted representatives across the agriculture supply chain including producers, freight operators, abattoirs and AgForce before starting road train access in July 2017.

During the initial six month period (to December 2017), over 40 operators were issued with permits to directly access the North Rockhampton abattoirs.

Central region has received enquiries from Morning Bulletin, WIN TV, Channel Nine and Seven re Rockhampton Ring Road latest – suggested response as follows with attached map (already on TMR website). TV's chasing for 3pm deadline.

Response: (Please attribute to a Transport and Main Roads spokesperson)

The Rockhampton Ring Road will improve connectivity to the hospital and airport.

Industrial areas in north Rockhampton and west of Gracemere will have a more direct freight route north and south as well as west to coalfields and prime agricultural areas.

Traffic on the Bruce Highway will avoid 17 sets of traffic signals through Rockhampton, reducing congestion especially for freight vehicles.

Over the next three years, a jointly funded Federal and State government Rockhampton Ring Road (Plan and Preserve) Project will confirm the future road alignment.

Protecting the future state-controlled road corridor does not mean there is an immediate requirement to acquire the identified land.

The process includes assessing, and placing conditional agreements on any development applications for property in the identified corridor.

Impacted landowners are being notified and some have been in contact with TMR.

We expect more landowners to receive notifications over the next week.

All impacted landowners will be invited to meet TMR representatives to discuss future land requirements, potential impacts to their property and their rights throughout the process.

Planning is expected to be finalised late next year.

At this time, no funding has been committed for building the Rockhampton Ring Road.

Compulsory property acquisitions are not occurring at this stage, however affected property owners may apply for consideration for an early purchase of their property under the TMR Early Acquisition Policy (available at www.tmr.qld.gov.au).

Background:

The Australian and Queensland Governments have jointly funded \$65 million (\$52 million Federal and \$13 million State) to complete The Rockhampton Ring Road (Plan and Preserve) Project over the next three years.

The Rockhampton Ring Road is the key piece of road infrastructure recommended in the Fitzroy River Floodplain and Road Planning Study published in December 2011, which investigated long-term solutions for Bruce Highway flooding, impacts on Weight, road and rail transport in and around the city of Rockhampton.

The Rockhampton Ring Road will provide a western link of the Bruce Highway to the west of Rockhampton, with key linkages into the city at the Capricorn Highway, Ridgelands Road, Alexandra Street and Yaamba Road (Rockhampton-Yeppoon Road).

The Rockhampton Ring Road (Plan and Preserve) Project will confirm the future road alignment in addition to completing environmental assessments, surveys and other investigations, develop the business case, and publish Future State-Controlled Road and future land requirements in the Queensland Government Gazette.



Fairer Fares PPQ (October 2017)

- The Government's Fairer Fares Package in response to the Fare Review Taskforce Report is the biggest change to public transport in SEQ in over a decade.
- The Government's Package benefits more than 93 per cent of SEQ public transport users by reducing their costs.

- Originally announced for a 1 January 2017 start, the package was rolled out early on Monday 19 December 2016, providing an extra two weeks of fare relief for customers.
- Key changes introduced on this date include:
 - Fewer zones reduced from 23 to 8 zones
 - Cheaper fares fares for all zones of travel reduced
 - Extended off-peak discount peak period now start from 6am (rather than 3am)
 - Kids go free on weekends Children under the age of 15 travel free on child go card
 - 8 and 50% for commuters the 'Nine and FREE' scheme has been replaced with an 'Eight and 50% off subsequent journeys' incentive
- The 'One, Two FREE' incentive for seniors and pensioners has also been retained.
- The Government's Fairer Fares Package makes public transport more affordable for local travel as well as travel by public transport over longer distances.
- Under the changes, most customers can expect to save between four and 34 per cent each trip. Many people will save several hundreds of dollars each year.
- As part of the package, the Government introduced concession fares in April last year for job seekers receiving Newstart Allowance or Youth Allowance, as well as Asylum seekers who reside in Queensland.
- The new concession fares are expected to benefit up to 192,000 Queensland residents and will provide much needed relief for two disadvantaged groups in the community, connecting job seekers and asylum seekers with important services such as employment, education, health and settlement support.

Fairer Fares PPQ (October 2017)

- The Government's Fairer Fares Package in response to the Fare Review Taskforce Report is the biggest change to public transport in SEQ in over a decade.
- The Government's Package benefits more than 93 per cent of SEQ public transport users by reducing their costs.

- Originally announced for a 1 January 2017 start, the package was rolled out early on Monday 19 December 2016, providing an extra two weeks of fare relief for customers.
- Key changes introduced on this date include:
 - Fewer zones reduced from 23 to 8 zones
 - Cheaper fares fares for all zones of travel reduced
 - Extended off-peak discount peak period now start from 6am (rather than 3am)
 - Kids go free on weekends Children under the age of 15 travel free on child go card
 - 8 and 50% for commuters the 'Nine and FREE' scheme has been replaced with an 'Eight and 50% off subsequent journeys' incentive
- The 'One, Two FREE' incentive for seniors and pensioners has also been retained.
- The Government's Fairer Fares Package makes public transport more affordable for local travel as well as travel by public transport over longer distances.
- Under the changes, most customers can expect to save between four and 34 per cent each trip. Many people will save several hundreds of dollars each year.
- As part of the package, the Government introduced concession fares in April last year for job seekers receiving Newstart Allowance or Youth Allowance, as well as Asylum seekers who reside in Queensland.
- The new concession fares are expected to benefit up to 192,000 Queensland residents and will provide much needed relief for two disadvantaged groups in the community, connecting job seekers and asylum seekers with important services such as employment, education, health and settlement support.

Fare Increase - January 2018

Veterans White Card concessions – February 2018

Suggested response

Take extra care when driving through roadworks for your safety and the safety of the road workers who are improving our roads.

When driving through roadworks you must:

- move into the correct lane (or designated area) as soon as possible
- slow down (to the reduced speed limit if one has been posted)
- drive very carefully
- look out for road workers
- follow road workers' instructions
- follow direction of the traffic controller if one is present
- watch for vehicles entering or leaving the area
- follow all signs
- keep a safe distance from all vehicles, barriers, equipment and road workers.

There were three recorded traffic controller fatalities in Queensland since 2013.

All were on duty at the time of the incidents.

Over the last three years we have recorded 20 incidents relating to public aggression.

In the same period we have also had 160 calls to our Roadworkers hotline relating to aggression, near misses and dangerous driving.

Suggested response

Transport costs make up a significant portion of families' expenses and it's important to monitor these costs so we are aware of the pressures people face.

Transport and Main Roads currently offers vehicle registration concessions to several eligible groups.

These include pensioner and seniors, charities, community organisations, primary producers and Special Interest Vehicles and historic vehicles.

As an example, pensioner Concession Card holders, with cards issued from 1 July 1994 onward currently receive a 50% concession on the registration fee component of their vehicle registration.

TMR has implemented measures to ease the cost of vehicle registration, this includes offering six monthly and quarterly payment terms.

In terms of a vehicle registration fee comparison with other states and territories, the total cost of registering a four cylinder family vehicle (for example a Toyota Corolla) is currently \$719.65 in Queensland.

By comparison in New South Wales the cost is \$1,067, in Victoria it is \$800.80, in the Northern Territory it is \$737.85, in South Australia it is \$733.75, in Western Australia it is \$721.40 in the Australia Capital Verritory it is \$1002.80 and in Tasmania it is \$556.30.

On a national level, Queensland is the second cheapest jurisdiction for registering a four cylinder vehicle.

In addition, other jurisdictions also impose additional registration requirements, like regular inspections, which come at a cost to the registered operator.

Queensland does not impose such requirements on private use vehicles.

To further assist Queenslanders with the cost of registration TMR is exploring options for shorter and more manageable registration terms.

Shorter terms are expected to help increase registration affordability and ensure there are fewer unregistered vehicles in use on Queensland roads.

Electric vehicles (EVs) offer a range of social, economic and environmental benefits.

The Queensland Government has recognised a key barrier to EV uptake is a lack of public charging infrastructure.

The Queensland Electric Vehicle Superhighway (QESH), will ensure the state is positioned for a transition to EVs.

Queensland currently leads the nation in regards to the rollout of publicly funded fast-charging stations.

Free charging at the QESH sites will be available to the end of December 2018.

The pricing arrangements will take into account the cost of providing the service, other value added services, and the need to ensure maximum use of the charging facilities.

Using electricity to fuel our vehicles is about 60 to 90 per cent cheaper than using fossil fuels.

Background

Any measure of transport affordability is subject to the underlying assumptions made in calculating that measure.

In the case of the AAA Transport Affordability Index, they have made very specific assumptions about a typical household which may not reflect reality.

For example they have defined the "typical" household as a family living in Beenleigh with both primary members of the household travelling to Brisbane CBD daily – one by car via the Clem 7.

However, based on the 2016 Census Journey to Work data, less than 8 per cent of Beenleigh residents travel to the Inner-City Brisbane for work purposes.

Most Beenleigh residents travel to Logan –Beaudesert or Gold coast for work purposes.

The AAA has also assumed that Sydney, Melbourne, and Brisbane households use toll roads to access the CBD, but the toll road network in Brisbane is not nearly as pervasive as it is in Sydney and Melbourne and it is Queensland government policy that a free alternative route is always available so no commuter is forced to use a toll road.

There are other indicators available to measure and compare the relative affordability of transport in Australian capital cities such as the Australian Bureau of Statistics' (ABS) Household Expenditure Survey (HES), and Consumer Price Index (CPI).

Latest results from the HES indicate that Sydney and Melbourne face the highest transport costs in Australia spending \$231.7 and \$221.4 per week, respectively. These cities are followed by Canberra (\$225.2) in third place and Brisbane (\$209.4) in fourth place.

When expenditure is compared with the median gross income of each capital city, Brisbane ranks fourth behind Hobart, Melbourne and Sydney. When expenditure is compared with median disposable income, Brisbane ranks third behind Hobart and Melbourne.

Changes in transport costs can also be tracked using the CPI published by the ABS, specifically for the transport group of goods and services.

The Transport Group CPI for Brisbane has seen a slight downward trend over the past four years.

For example, the Transport Group CPI for Brisbane reported in December 2017 is around 2 per cent lower than that of December 2013.

While transport affordability indices such as those produced by the AAA can provide a useful guide in terms of the costs of travel, care needs to be taken in terms of what

assumptions these indices are based on and whether these assumptions accurately reflect typical households commuting for work.

Running cost assumptions: EV consumption of 1.8kWh/100km (at the power point) and electricity cost of \$0.06-\$0.28/kWh equals \$1.00-\$5.04/100km; and average passenger vehicle petrol consumption of 10.5L/100km and average petrol price of \$1.25/L equals \$13.25/100km.)



This includes providing an Options Analysis Report to consider the impacts of groyne construction and other feasible alternatives, to ensure the solution adequately addresses the problem.

This report will be used to support permit application assessment.

Works were due to begin next month however this will be dependent on provision of the necessary permits.

Any new timeframes would need to consider suitable tides and the availability of Townsville City Council to complete the work.

Extension of the permit process will not impact the estimated construction cost of about \$210,000.

Background

TMR is responsible for maintaining the water flow under the breakwater bridge. This involves removing sand from under the bridge annually and using this sand to replenish Nelly Bay Beach.

TMR has an obligation under our marine parks permit to allow the flow of water under the breakwater bridge for environmental reasons.

Townsville City Council has an interest as well, as it is responsible for the beach.





Transport preparations for the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games are well advanced.

Transport and Main Roads is implementing initiatives to support increased safety and reliability of the M1 during the GC 2018 Games.

We are mindful the Gold Coast and Queensland will be on show and our regular maintenance schedule has been adapted, with the M1 being swept for litter closer to the start of the Games and regularly between some of the exits during the Games.

Over the past five years up to 2017, the cost of litter collection across Queensland on state-controlled has remained about \$5 million a year.

Under Road Maintenance Asset Management and Performance Contracts, maintenance contractors, including local councils, are responsible for collecting roadside rubbish on TMR's behalf.

Contract rates for litter collection vary depending on the road and its environment.

Based on total expenditure, we estimate this would amount to about 14,000 cubic metres of litter collected every year.

It is the responsibility of every Queensland road user to help prevent littering and motorists are required by law to secure their loads and put any litter in bins rather than throwing it out the window. Fines of \$252 apply for roadside littering.

TMR encourages the community to assist with rubbish disposal and provides bins for litter collection at rest areas.

TMR does not centrally collate information regarding the engagement of the Queensland Police Service (QPS) at our roadworks sites.

Police presence at road works sites falls into two categories:

1. Routine use of police as a traffic control measure

Where a requirement is identified under a traffic guidance scheme, police officers may be engaged to assist in the control of traffic around or through work sites.

In this case the construction contractor is responsible for making all necessary arrangements with the QPS.

The cost of these engagements is included within the total traffic management costs for each project and specific costings are not available to TMR.

2. Enforcement activities

We have a formal process for requesting enforcement activities by QPS at roadworks sites. In this case deployment of police resources is at the discretion of the QPS.



Suggested response

Maintaining access to the Mooloolah River channel is a state priority to ensure the reliability of pilotage services to international shipping and meet the needs of the

commercial fishing fleet.

Shoaling is a natural and dynamic phenomenon caused by ides and waves. It requires constant monitoring.

We carry out fortnightly surveys and have had a dredge operating since November last year.

About \$700,000 was spent on dredging the entrance last year.

The desired channel depth of 2.5 metres had been restored when bad weather resulted in more shoaling.

Dredging resumed in mid-January, but was hampered by more rough weather.

At the time of the last survey on 6 February 2018, the depth of the channel course at low tide was one metre however greated epths were available to vessels where shoaling wasn't as severe.

Heavy swells are preventing efforts to survey present depths but we will undertake another survey and start dredging as soon as conditions improve.

The river mouth is navigable but we always encourage mariners to exercise extreme caution when entering the giver channel and inexperienced masters should not make the

attempt.

We have had no recent reports of vessels grounding or reports of injuries.

Dredging of the internal harbour channels is expected to occur in 2019.

In the meantime plans are underway to undertake some interim bed levelling works near the pile moorings and pilot jetty to improve depths.

Response

Nexus uses certified drinking water for workers at site locations on the Toowoomba Second Range Crossing project where town water is not available.

Water quality testing of water storage tanks on site was undertaken last week.

Results indicated a system flush was required at four of thirteen locations due to low levels of a common bacteria in the water tanks.

Staff were advised of the water testing results and given bottled water as an alternative while the affected tanks were disinfected.

Site water will be reinstated over the coming days and the water re-tested following the system flush.

Nexus is committed to providing drinking water for its workers that meets Australian Drinking Water Guidelines and complies with the Public

Health Act 2005.

They reckon they've been using that water for about a week.

"They're not telling us anything. They're saying trust them, whatever they found in water was not bad enough to make us sick. Yet men have been missing the job because they were sick." One worker said.

We undertook community engagement in 2010 on the Fitzroy River Floodplain and Road Planning Study which recommended a western alignment of the Bruce Highway at Rockhampton.

Since the proposed alignment was released in 2013, several land owners have been in contact to discuss potential impacts to their property.

We currently estimate about 55 land owners will be affected.

We need to preserve and protect the alignment as a future state-controlled road corridor.

This process includes extensive consultation with potentially affected land owners.

We will need to assess, and possibly place conditions, on any development applications for the identified properties.

The \$65 million, federal-state funded Rockhampton Ring Road plan-and-preserve project will confirm the number of properties impacted by the future state-controlled road corridor.

All land owners along the proposed road corredor will be contacted in coming months to discuss the process to preserve and protect the future corridor, future land impacts and their rights throughout the process.

We provide easily accessible information including licence requirements, road rules, tips for driving in Queensland and hints for safe driving which all available online.

There are a range of local initiatives in north Queensland in particular, which reinforce driving on the left such as stickers, markings and signs to remind overseas motorists.

We are investing \$989 million on infrastructure improvements along the Bruce Highway, which is Queensland's main tourist route.

This includes providing 'Keep Left' stickers to car hire companies to remind drivers to stay on the left side of the road.

We have commissioned the Centre of Accident Research and Road Safety Queensland (CARRS-Q) at Queensland University of Technology to investigate patterns of crashes by

international drivers and develop education campaigns and materials which best help them stay safe on Queensland Roads.

This research is well underway and expected to be completed in early 2019.

For the safety of road users, the Kianawah Road level crossing at Lindum is fitted with the highest level of protection, with flashing lights, boom gates and warning signs on all approaches.

Over the past five years, Queensland Rail has seen an 80 per cent decrease in the number of near miss incidents with vehicles at this location, with only one near miss with a vehicle reported recently in 2017.

In the same period of time, we've also seen a 50 per cent decrease in near miss incidents involving pedestrians at the Kianawah Road crossing.

We encourage road users to please keep their safety front of mind when travelling near the rail network, ensuring they abide by the signs and signals in place for their protection at level crossings.

A "HEARTBREAKING" vision splayed across a Rockhampton Rd stretch as Rose Hindman drove her regular route Sunday morning.

Three ducklings lay dead across two lanes of traffic, as did their apparent mother and father, in what Rose believes was a deliberate act to slaughter them all.

The local said she often drives through the stretch through the lights near The Pines estate, and believes the 80kmh speed limit and two-lane traffic in both directions provides ample time and space to avoid the wildlife, which other locals have said is common to the area.

Though she did not witness the incident unfold, Rose believes it was "completely avoidable" and wants the relevant authorities to take action and warn motorists to the natives.

She suggested duck crossing signs be installed; if not permanently, at least as a temporary measure.

"We have all the other wildlife signs, maybe (we should have) something just to put up during duck season, to make people more aware that 'hey, there's babies about'," she said.

Rose shared her concerns to the Yeppoon Families Facebook page Sunday morning, which has since sparked a social media discussion to the dangers the situation poses to motorists and wildlife.

"To the heartless person who couldn't spare a few seconds to slow down and let a mother duck and ducklings cross the road safely at the traffic lights near the Pines estate," Rose wrote.

"It broke my heart to see them splattered all over the road."

Jo Stoyel backed a call for signage, and commented that members of the public had also helped save a number of ducks at the Tanby Rd roundabout near Bunnings during a previous season. Others have said the family of ducks has returned to this busy spot in recent weeks.

A number of locals commented they had scouted the surrounding areas and drains for signs of more ducklings after the Sunday morning incident, but did not find anything but the dead family of ducks.

Some have suggested it may have been a truck unable to break in time, and another said days ago they watched someone swerve into oncoming traffic at the 80kmh section because there was a duck on the road.

Concerns surround oil leaking into waterways, and the danger of loose boats when a storm sweeps through.

What are the laws on boats anchoring in the Mooloolah River?

Who is responsible for removing boats?

Is it being adequately monitored?

Suggested response

It is always the owners' responsibility to ensure the seaworthiness of their vessel and to remove it before it becomes a hazard to navigation or the environment.

We have traced the owner of an unnamed and unregistered derelict yacht in the Mooloolah River.

They have engaged a professional contractor to remove and dispose of the vessel at no cost to the taxpayer.

We closely monitor vessels which use Mooloolah River and identify abandoned craft which have deteriorated to the point where they have to be removed.

Background

We have a three-tier strategy to address the issue of derelict vessels in coastal waterways.

- Identify vessels where all efforts to locate the owner or induce them to remove the vessel have been unsuccessful and consider funding options for their removal.
- Where owners are located, advise them of their esponsibilities and the potential court costs for failing to remove their vessels.
- Implement stronger education and compliance programs to ensure boat owners know their responsibilities.

The Rockhampton Ring Road will provide a western link of the Bruce Highway connecting at the Capricorn Highway, south of Rockhampton and joining at the Rockhampton-Yeppoon Road intersection in the north. (Map attached)

It will improve access to the hospital and airport, as well as industrial areas in north Rockhampton and west of Gracemere providing a more direct route for freight movements north and south, and west to the coalfields and prime agricultural areas.

Joint Federal and State funding (\$52 million Federal and \$13 million State) has been committed for the planning and preservation phase of the project to identify a future road and rail corridor.

The recommended alignment will integrate with major infrastructure already completed, including Yeppen North and Yeppen South and current works in development, including the Rockhampton Northern Access Upgrade and Capricorn Highway Duplication (Rockhampton- Gracemere).

Planning is expected to be finalised late next year.

Future funding for the Rockhampton Ring Road will be assessed against competing state-wide priorities.

Suggested response

Across Queensland in 2017, 55 people were injured in 322 reported marine incidents, including 21 who were admitted to hospital and seven fatalities.

Fewer people were injured than at any time in the last decade.

However, sadly, none of the people who drowned or are presumed to have drowned are known to have been wearing a life jacket.

In the Cairns region, as at June 2017, there were 22,001 recreational vessels registered; one vessel for every 13 people or one vessel for every three recreational vessel licensees.

During 2017, this region received 23 marine incident reports involving 34 vessels — 29 Queensland regulated ships and five domestic commercial vessels.

The most commonly reported incidents were nine collisions between ships, three collisions with objects and three capsizes.

Thirty-five vessels were damaged including nine lost, three with major damage and six with moderate damage.

In this region one person was admitted to hospital and no fatalities were reported.

In the Carpentaria Shire there were 263 Queensland registered recreational vessels, 631 recreational marine driver licence-holders and 34 personal watercraft (jetski) licence-holders.

In the Burke Shire there were 21 Queensland registered recreational vessels, 54 recreational marine driver licence-holders and five personal watercraft (jetski) licence-holders.





Transurban Queensland operates Brisbane's toll roads and toll tunnels under long-term toll concession deeds with either the state (Gateway and Logan motorways and Airportlink) or Brisbane City Council (Clem7, Legacy Way and Go Between Bridge).

The contractual arrangements between the parties are set out in the concession deed for each toll facility.

In relation to the concession deeds let by the state, the Queensland government has no financial obligation to Transurban Queensland if the toll revenues for the Gateway Motorway, Logan Motorway or Airportlink fail to meet forecasts.



The Queensland Government supports the movement of freight on rail and acknowledges the economic, social and environmental benefits.

The decline of rail freight tonnages on the Mount Isa to Townsville rail corridor in recent years is only partially related to price.

In recent years the volume of freight being transferred by rail has been affected by factors including fluctuations in global commodity prices resulting in lower export volumes.

Queensland Rail is spending over \$300 million over five years from 2017-18 for works including rail replacement and other track enhancements.

The Queensland Government committed an additional \$50 million during the 2017 State Election to further improve the performance of the Mount Isa to Townsville rail line.

The Queensland Government has undertaken a review of the current freight strategy, *Moving Freight*.

It has been guided by the Queensland Ministerial Freight Council (QMFC), the key multi-modal freight advisory body.

The review has resulted in a draft Queensland Freight Strategy (QFS), providing a robust new framework for the freight system for the next 10 years.

A two-year Queensland Freight Action Plan (QFAP) is also under development to implement the draft QFS.

Questions

We took photos on Sunday of blue, floating pontoon in Rosslyn Bay Harbour that boat skipper told us was soon to be used to remove mooring poles that no longer have boats tied to them. He said "the word" is that poles will be removed and a new marina will replace them.

There are still mooring poles to which local boats are attached – at much lower annual fee than any marina – so there is much angst about the future.

Would you please either allay fears – or create more angst – and advise what is going to happen, and when

It looks like the government is opting out of the boat mooring business and leaving it to private enterprise. But we could be wrong.

Also, the existing poles were placed and/or replaced not really that long ago in mooring poles terms.

Suggested response

We are committed to keeping Rosslyn Bay Boat Harbour safe for marine industry and recreational boat users.

We recently audited infrastructure in the harbour, which included our pile moorings which were installed in the late 1970s.

Some were found to be corroded, and to minimise public risk, we will remove unused moorings.

This won't affect the current 25 pile moorings still held by users within the Rosslyn Bay Boat Harbour.

There is a decreased demand for these types of moorings which are costly to install and maintain.

Over time we anticipate pile moorings will be replaced with infrastructure which better meets the needs of the modern marine industry and vessel owners.





Derelict vessel removal funded

The Palaszczuk Government has allocated \$20 million in the State Budget to remove derelict ve spoiling Queensland's beautiful coast.

Speaking from Cairns today, Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said the funding, spover four years, would allow Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ) to step in when boat owners re to cooperate in the removal process.

"MSQ has a program to identify and respond to neglected vessels," Mr Bailey said.

"They currently have about 270 boats of concern on their list, and this funding will allow them t prioritise the most serious navigational and environmental hazards.

"For example, in Far North Queensland, MSQ recently removed and broke up a 34-metre steel-half ship which ran aground on Inset Reef in 2009, and again on Madge Reef near Horn Island."

Mr Bailey said before a civil contractor stepped in, every effort would be made to ensure boat of were held accountable.

"We're determined to protect our environment from irresponsible boat owners," Mr Bailey said.

"It's always the owners' responsibility to manage the removal of their boat at their own cost.

"But this funding will be of great help if boaties don't comply."

Mr Bailey said MSQ has had success in recovering costs from owners in the past.

"Recently, the Townsville District Court awarded MSQ almost \$800,000, ordering the owner of *Defender* pay for the State's disposal of the vessel," he said.

"These kinds of outcomes send a clear message to irresponsible owners, that they can't just durand run."

Member for Cairns Michael Healy said the news would be particularly welcome in the Far North.

"We know this issue creates concern among locals, given our proximity to the Reef and world cl fishing zones, so it's heariening to see something being done," he said.

Member for Cook Cynthia Lui said the \$20 million cemented the Palaszczuk Government's commitment to protecting the environment along the state's iconic coastlines.

"The worst of Queensland's coastal eyesores will now be consigned to the scrapheap," she said.

This is a query that relates to negotiations involving the Department of Transport and Main Roads and follows a decision made by the Cabinet Budget Review Committee, so I'm sending to you all to see who would want to respond.

I understand negotiations are ongoing between Adani, DTMR, the Office of the Coordinator General and Isaac Regional Council about funding for the upgrade of the Elgin-Moray Road and the Moray-Carmichael Road that links to the Carmichael mine site.

Suggested response

The Queensland Government is committed to improving the South East Queensland (SEQ) transport network, supporting urban growth and development.

ShapingSEQ, the 2017 South East Queensland Regional Plan, includes a high frequency public transport link to Coolangatta in the 2041 strategic public transport system.

Cross River Rail is the Queensland Government's highest priority infrastructure project which will enable the optimisation of the SEQ rail network and provide opportunities for future expansion of the network including the extension of the Gold Coast line beyond Varsity Lakes.

A heavy rail alignment from Varsity Lakes to the Gold Coast Airport was identified in 2009 and continues to be protected for the future. The extension assumes dual track to Tugun (with a single track continuing to the Gold Coast Airport), with stations located at Tallebudgera, Elanora and Tugun.

The Queensland Government continues to invest in public transport infrastructure on the Gold Coast to ensure the public transport system can continue to expand while improving efficiency and transport connections for Gold Coast residents and commuters

The Queensland Government has recently invested \$163 million into the Coomera to Helensvale Rail Duplication project to deliver improved reliability and increased services for Gold Coast customers, including the opening of Gold Coast Light Rail (Stage 2) in December 2017.

The Queensland Government has also committed to the delivery of three new heavy rail stations at Pimpama, Helensvale North, and Worongary/Merrimac to service the Gold Coast's growing population and ease pressure on the M1.

The extension of the heavy rail from Varsity Lakes to the Gold Coast Airport is subject to funding and competing state-wide priorities.

Background Information (not for release):

In 2005 the Department of Transport and Main Roads completed planning for a proposed extension of the heavy rail passenger line from Robina to Tugun.

Additional planning for a further extension to the Gold Coast Airport was completed in 2009.

Following community consultation, a preferred heavy rail corridor alignment between Robina and the Gold Coast Airport was identified and preserved in 2009.

The extension of the heavy rail from Varsity Lakes to the Gold Coast Airport is subject to funding and state-wide priorities.

However, the Queensland Government is committed to protecting the interests of the state and the people who live here.

While four of the five sections of the proposed Inland Rail alignment in Queensland have been declared Coordinated Projects and require an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under the Queensland State Development and Public Works Act (1971) the Kagaru to Acacia Ridge and Bromelton (K2AB) section of the alignment is an existing operational interstate rail line leased to ARTC under the Queensland Land Act (1994).

The Queensland Government understands communities along the K2AB alignment have raised concerns about the possible increase in freight train numbers and their associated impacts.

As the owner of the corridor, the Queensland Government is working with ARTC to ensure they meet stringent environmental and social obligations for proposed works and future operations along that route.

Community Consultative Committees (CCCs) were set up by ARTC to support the EIS process. Requests for a CCC or the like for the K2AB alignment is more appropriately addressed to ARTC.





Our number one infrastructure priority is the delivery of the \$5.4 billion Cross River Rail which will enable the expansion and optimisation of the SEQ rail network including the Sunshine Coast line.

Our Queensland Transport Investment Scheme (QTRIP) outlines \$21 billion of transport and roads infrastructure for 2017-18 to 2020-21.

The Australian and Queensland Governments have also jointly committed to upgrading the M1 Pacific Motorway, including two major projects, the Gateway Merge and Mudgeeraba to Varsity Lakes upgrade.

Questions: The department has uncovered the potential presence of unexploded ordnance at the Scarborough Boat Harbour. What has the department uncovered and how was this uncovered?

We recently commissioned a consultant to investigate the feasibility of building a barge landing ramp and other infrastructure at the Scarborough Boat Harbour.

As part of these investigations, we sourced historical planning information from the former Department of Harbours and Marine (circa 1983/1984) records, when reclamation of part of the harbour was undertaken near the potential landing site for a barge service.

The records included a plan showing a notation indicating 'foul ground – explosives may be found in this vicinity' at the end of the former Thurecht Jetty.

The jetty has since been removed.

The 'foul ground' area is not close to the location of the proposed barge landing site and required dredging will not include that area.

We will take advice from the consultants on any further ordnance issues.





Transurban Queensland operates the toll roads and toll tunnels under long term toll concession deeds with either the State (Gateway and Logan motorways and AirportLink) or Brisbane City Council (Clem7, Legacy Way and Go Between Bridge).

The State has agreements in place with Transurban Queensland to suspend tolls on each of the toll roads in certain circumstances.

For example, tolls may be suspended during times of natural disasters (Queensland floods, 2011), where there are significant faults with the infrastructure (repair of the M1 following truck fire in 2017), or where there may be a threat to public safety.

A toll suspension is publicly funded. Government considers these matters carefully and employs these powers only in extraordinary circumstances.

The Queensland Government understands Brisbane City Council has similar provisions in its toll concession deeds for the Clem7 and Legacy Way tunnels.



Why has the State Government changed regulations for the trial? What are the criteria for 'left turn on red' sites? If only seven sites are to be used by Brisbane as 'left turn on red', is it worth continuing with the trial?

Suggested response

We identified an increased safety risk to pedestrians and cyclists where Left Turn on Red LTOR was in place at certain Brisbane intersections.

This was based on an independent review of (LTOR) by the Centre for Accident Research and Road Safety – Queensland (CARRS-Q)

This included 'near misses' where drivers were focussed on finding a gap in the oncoming traffic and were unaware of pedestrian and cyclist movements.

We also looked to New South Wales' experience with LTOR as they were the first state to implement and trial LTOR more than 30 years ago.

They have a revised their guidelines to include extra mandatory criteria to protect pedestrians and cyclists in response to a report from the NSW Centre for Road Safety.

Transport and Main Roads is implementing changes to our traffic signal operations following recommendations arising from two recent coronial inquests (in Queensland and NSW), which also initiated the revision of the NSW guidelines and similar changes to traffic signal operations.

The Queensland Government takes the safety of all road users very seriously and has adopted the recommendations from the independent experts and BCC agreed to do likewise.

We consider those guidelines a reliable safety indicator based on New South Wales' experience of many years.

Among a range of checks for sight selection we consider volume of pedestrian activity, who's crossing, such as children and elderly people and if there is a sufficient view of traffic on right.

There are 49 trial sites across Brisbane.

BCC have announced the removal of seven leaving 42 sites.

Hot Issues Brief attached and as follows;

The councillor's claim that "due to government changes some 'Left Turn on Red sites across <u>Brisbane</u> will be removed" fails to acknowledge the duty of care to road user safety and is not correct.

Five trial Left Turn on Red sites have operated in Brisbane since 2013 and TMR approved another 45 trial sites in 2014, conditional on an agreed site selection process and Brisbane City Council (BCC) commissioning an independent evaluation of the LTOR trial.

One of the fifty sites has since been decommissioned by BCC due to safety concerns.

The independent review, commissioned by BCC, of Left Turn on Red (LTOR) was conducted by the Centre for Accident Research and Road Safety – Queensland (CARRS-Q) which identified an increased safety risk to pedestrians and cyclists where LTOR is in place at certain Brisbane intersections.

The report acknowledged the convenience benefits to motorists with a measured saving of nine seconds on average for left turning vehicles at treated sites. CARRS-Q recommended a number of mitigating treatments be adopted to address safety risks and BCC has committed to implementing these recommendations.

NSW has applied LTOR for more than 30 years but due to safety concerns, Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) NSW recently revised their site selection criteria in response to a report prepared by the NSW Centre for Road Safety.

Transport and Main Roads is implementing changes to our traffic signal operations following recommendations arising from two recent coronial inquests (in Queensland and NSW), which also initiated the revision of the NSW guidelines and similar changes to their traffic signal operations.

At its peak NSW had some 1000 treated locations and over 95% LTOR sites nationally (with a hand full of sites in South Australia, Northern Territory and the ACT). In 2017 the number of sites in NSW had reduced to 200 sites with this number expected to reduce further with the release of the new guidelines.

TMR extended the LTOR trial to December 2019 subject to BCC implementing the CARRS-Q recommendations immediately, where safety issues have been identified, and to reviewing all sites to ensure that they conform to the new guideline adopted by RMS NSW, given the wider application and longer experience of LTOR in NSW.

BCC's Congestion Reduction Unit (CRU) were investigating the feasibility of adopting the recommendations of the RMS guidelines and TMR advised that officers would also be pleased to assist CRU in reviewing the sites where non-conformance with the RMS guidelines were identified before the 30 May 2018 deadline. BCC have made no further contact with TMR about the removal of the seven sites.

The Queensland Government takes the safety of all road users very seriously and has adopted the recommendations from the independent experts (CARRS-Q) which BCC agreed to do likewise as part of extending the trial.

Any changes to the current trial guidelines have been informed by independent advice commissioned by BCC, the experience of NSW following their many years of experience in managing the balance between safety and convenience and the recommendations arising from two coronial inquests.

BACKGROUND

- LTOR is the practice of permitting a vehicle in the left-hand lane, which is facing a red traffic light, to turn left after coming to a complete stop and giving way to other vehicles and pedestrians on the intersection.
- The independent review of Left Turn on Red (LTOR) conducted by the Centre for Accident Research and Road Safety – Queensland (CARRS-Q) found a reduced delay on average of nine seconds for left turn vehicles at LTOR sites. It also recognised an increased safety risk to pedestrians and cyclists where LTOR is in place at certain Brisbane intersections.
- No major incidents occurred during the LTOR trial but a number of 'near misses' were observed such that cyclists and pedestrians had to stop their crossing to ensure driver awareness.

- Drivers making a left hand turn must look for gaps in traffic on their right while also checking for
 pedestrians crossing from their left and right. These conflicts are exacerbated by drivers not coming
 to a complete stop or stopping forward of the stop line and blocking the pedestrian crossing.
- The CARRS-Q review made a number of recommendations to address the safety risks identified. The Queensland Government takes the safety of all road users very seriously and has adopted the recommendations from the independent experts and BCC agreed to do likewise.
- To further protect vulnerable road users, TMR examined the New South Wales (NSW) experience with LTOR. NSW was the first state to implement and trial LTOR over 30 years ago. Roads and Maritime Services NSW site selection criteria was previously based on the Australian Standard that TMR approved for use by Brisbane City Council.
- RMS NSW has developed and adopted a revised guideline in response to a report from the NSW
 Centre for Road Safety. The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) considers that the
 RMS guidelines are useful as a safety indicator as they are based on New South Wales' experience
 of operating LTOR over many years. This guideline includes a number of additional mandatory
 criteria to protect pedestrian and cyclist safety.
- In NSW, there were approximately 1000 LTOR intersections at implementation, these have been reduced to 200 and are likely to continue to reduce following the release by RMS of revised guidelines that have more restrictions on the use of LTOR.
- TMR's latest 'Approved Notice' requires existing trial sites to be assessed against the new RMS guidelines (July 2016) and conform to these guidelines by 30 May 2018.
- BCC wrote to TMR on 13 December 2017 and advised the potential impact of complying with the recently updated Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) guidelines at existing LTOR trial sites.
- The letter outlined that 24 sites would fail to meet the safety requirements, as per the new RMS guidelines and would require removal from the LTOR trial.
- TMR's response acknowledged BCC's Congestion Reduction Unit (CRU) was requested to investigate the feasibility of adopting the recommendations of the RMS guidelines.
- TMR officers offered to assist CRU in reviewing the 24 sites to understand areas of nonconformance with the RMS guidelines before 30 May 2018 deadline to improve road safety at these sites, and to better inform the proposed amendment to AS1742.14.
- No response has been received from BCC to above correspondence.
- It should be noted that the BCC traffic management system is generally not configured to be responsive to vehicle occupancy late at night, creating a level of frustration among Brisbane drivers.
- For information only CTOR is in conflict with TMR's mandatory pedestrian protection signal phasing initiative progressively being introduced at all state controlled signalised intersections (including intersections with council roads), following the outcomes of a recent coronial inquest.
- Queensland has implemented signalling changes following two recent coronial inquests (in Queensland and NSW), which also initiated the signalling changes in NSW. The coronial inquests recommended improvements at signalised crossings when pedestrians and motorists have green signals at the same time.
- TMR has a pedestrian protection program that will see progressive modification of existing signalised intersections to the late start arrangement to improve safety.
- The two-phase signal program is designed to increase pedestrian safety at signalised intersections by requiring a 'late start' for left turning vehicles when the pedestrian crossing is activated.





In preparation for the introduction of the New Generation Rollingstock fleet on the Queensland Rail network, 74 sites were investigated as potential stabling locations to cater for the increasing fleet size.

Of these locations, 16 – including Resewood – were shortlisted for further investigations and each site's suitability to house stabling facilities, rail operations and rail systems were assessed in detail.

The Rosewood site was not progressed as a final option, due to a number of reasons including the positioning of additional stabling at the nearby NGR Wulkuraka Maintenance Centre on the Ipswich corridor and potential flooding risks at the site that would require further management.

The final additional stabling sites commissioned as part of the rollout of the NGR fleet are located at Robina, Elimbah, Wombye and Banyo, with additional sidings at Bowen Hills and Kippa-Ring.

Suggested response

The number of vehicles in Queensland is projected to increase from around 4 million in 2018 to 6.3 million in 2048, based on current ownership trends.

This equates to annual growth of 1.5 per cent compared to projected annual growth rate in the population of 1.6 per cent.

The number of daily public transport trips is projected to increase from around 550,000 trips per day in 2018 to 1.6 million trips per day in 2048.

This equates to an annual growth rate of 3.6 per cent.

The number of additional weekday public transport services is projected to increase from around 12,500 bus services per day in 2018 to 24,000 bus services per day in 2048.

Passenger rail services within south east Queensland are projected to increase from around 1,350 rail services per week day in 2018 to 2,800 rail services per week day in 2048.

The Queensland Government is committed to revitalising and transforming south east Queensland's rail network so it can meet the challenges of a growing population and provide customers a high performing rail service.

South East Queensland's Rail Horizon outlines network solutions, including the Queensland Government's highest priority infrastructure project – Cross River Rail which is core to this long-term rail network strategy.

Over the 25 year horizon, ShapingSEQ: South Fast Queensland Regional Plan 2017 has identified priority region-shaping infrastructure projects including:

- Cross River Rail
- Brisbane Metro
- South East Busway Extension to Springwood
- Eastern Busway extension to Carindale and Capalaba
- Northern Busway extension to Bracken Ridge
- Extending high frequency public transport connections from Browns Plains to South East Busway
- Frequent public transport to major expansion growth areas including Caboolture West and Yarrabilba
- Dedicated Freight Rail Corridor between Acacia Ridge and Port of Brisbane
- Ipswich to Springfield Public Transport Corridor
- Salisbury to Flagstone Passenger Rail corridor

The next 30 years will see Queensland's transport system changing significantly.

Automated vehicles, electric vehicles and shared transport services, will pose challenges and significant opportunities for our transport system.

Many of these new services and technologies are still in their infancy and more are likely to emerge over the next 30 years.

Transport and Main Roads is developing the Queensland Transport Strategy – a long-term strategy that will position Queensland's transport system to benefit from the opportunities from these changes and foster the right environment to address the challenges.

Modelling commissioned by the department suggests that the combination of automated vehicles and shared transport services has the potential to significantly improve Queensland's transport.

Journeys are likely to be safer, more efficient and more convenient.

The convergence of automated vehicles and shared transport also presents opportunities to manage congestion, by making better use of existing road capacity and the vehicles on those roads.

A new service model known as Mobility as a Service (MaaS), seamlessly combines all modes of transport, including private vehicles, shared transport and active transport, allowing customers to plan, purchase and track their end-to-end journeys via a single app.

For example, in 30 years' time, transport in SEQ could be operated as a MaaS model.

High volume, high frequency mass transit services could run to and from key activity centres.

Demand-responsive services (such as shared automated vehicles) could seamlessly connect customers to the high frequency services at key hubs and serve to cover the "first and last mile".

TransLink has received a small quantity of feedback (approx. 10 between 2015 and 2018) regarding services between Belmont and Brisbane city during peak travel times.

As a suburb, Belmont consists of generally low density residential development. This, coupled with general road layouts and traffic calming, make servicing the area by bus challenging.

Belmont is currently serviced by bus toutes 213, 215, P216 and 225 which travel via Belmont Road. All of these services, with the exception of route 213, travel via Thurston, Castlerea, and Annette Streets to increase access for residents in the area to the east of Belmont Road. Based on the current levels of demand, it is considered that the service levels and hours of operation are adequate.

There is also a high level of service provided by bus routes along the Wynnum and Old Cleveland Road corridors. For bus routes currently operating in Belmont, the preference is to provide connections to these services at the major interchange points at Cannon Hill, Carindale and Wynnum. At these interchanges, public transport users can then transfer to high frequency peak time services travelling to and from Brisbane's CBD, with these services having longer operating hours. Information about these services and assistance for customers in planning such travel is available through the TransLink Call Centre by phoning 13 12 30, and the TransLink Journey Planner available on TransLink's website at www.translink.com.au.

TransLink is committed to providing an integrated, efficient, and accessible public transport network for Queensland.

TransLink will continue to monitor demand for such services and will work with, both, its service operator and residents in considering future improvements to public transport for the area.

The woman says she's filled three petitions and is processing more, receiving

"hundreds" of signatures in support of her proposal to increase frequency of bus services and also bus routes around the region.

She says bus drivers have previously told her there won't be an increase unless the demand is there, which in part gave her the idea to pursue the petitions. I have already contacted Polley's coaches, which operates the bus services in Gympie.

TransLink has received a small number of requests for additional services in Gympie in recent years.

TransLink monitors service levels to ensure customer demand can be accommodated. Ticketing data indicates there is ample capacity available on Gympie bus services.

Service increases, whether frequency or span of hours, involve significant financial investment to provide additional vehicle and driver resources and must be prioritised against competing requests across the state.

There are currently no plans to increase service levels in the short-term, however, TransLink will continue to monitor growth and development in the Gympie area and work closely with Polleys Coaches, Gympie Regional Council and the wider community to provide the pest possible public transport network.

The Newstead-Teneriffe area is currently well serviced by a number of regular routes, including a number of high frequency bus services, such as the Blue City Glider 60, Buz Route 199, Route 393 and Route 470.

Routes 393, 300, 302, 305, 306 and 322 also service the area.

TransLink will continue to monitor demand in the area and work closely with Brisbane City Council and the wider community to best meet customer demand.

Existing Services

- 1. Blue Glider route 60: Operates at least every 15 minutes off peak and every 5 minutes during peak between 5:30am and 11:30pm Sunday to Thursday. The service runs 24 hours on Friday and Saturday. This route services the Gasworks precinct and terminates at Teneriffe Ferry.
- 2. BUZ route 199: Operates at least every 15 minutes off peak and every 10 minutes during peak between 6am and 11:30pm, 7 days a week. This route services Brunswick St, Merthyr Rd and Macquarie St to Teneriffe Ferry.

She made several representations before that to get it moved but they've gone nowhere apparently, suffice to say she often can't get in or out of her driveway.



RESPONSE

Where possible, TransLink attempts to avoid placing bus stops where buses will block driveways while picking up or dropping of passengers. However, in some instances, this is unavoidable and a bus may briefly block a driveway.

Under the Transport Operations (Road Use Management—Road Rules) Regulation 2009 Part 12 Restrictions on stopping and parking section 198, buses are permitted to stop across driveways when servicing a bus stop.

As this bus stop location meets transLink's guidelines, it will remain in this location at this point in time. A bus stop is required in this location in order to provide convenient access to public transport for the surrounding community.

TransLink has instructed Kangaroo Bus Lines, the operator servicing St Eugene College, to ensure they are not blocking driveways for extended periods of time during the afternoon school pick-up.

On December 2016, the State Government introduced the Fairer Fares package, benefitting 93 per cent of customers and providing cost of living relief for people living in South East Queensland.

Since the inception of Fairer Fares, public transport customers in Queensland have taken over 210 million passenger journeys, saving over \$91 million.

Fares in the South East are around 44 cents, or 13.5%, lower on average per eligible adult trip than they were before the introduction of Farrer Fares in December 2016.

The State Government has also delivered savings through the introduction of a number of concession and discount schemes, including:

Under the Fairer Fares package, the State Government froze fares until January 2018, when fares increased by 1.5%, in line with the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for South East Queensland.

The increase balanced affordability, while also covering the increased cost of providing all public transport services, such as driver and support staff wages, fuel and vehicle costs.

About 97 per cent of full fare South East Queensland commuters saw an increase of between 5c and 12c per trip. Even with the CPI price rise, fares in South East Queensland still remain cheaper than they were in 2014.

The most recent TransLink Tracker shows bus, train, ferry and tram services all reported an increase in patronage during the latest reported quarter with a combined 43.3 million trips representing a two per cent increase for this period.

Backgrounds for Minister's office

Since 2010 with the introduction of the fare-path strategy, TransLink fare changes shifted to January designed to minimise any service impacts.

Before 2010, SEQ fares were historically set in line with CPI increases usually

in July to coincide with other annual changes to transport fees and charges.

The creation of the Fare Advisory Panel was recommended as part of the introduction of the Fairer Fares package in 2016.

The Fare Advisory Panel will include up to six members, including a Chair. Members will have expertise in public transport or represent public transport user groups.

Dr Kellie Nutall is the chair and other appointments have been made ahead of the panel's first expected meeting this month.

These appointment are not public yet and have been listed on MOD for discussion.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) issues Booked Hire Service Licences (BHSLs) to individuals, who are able to provide ride-booking services for any authorised booking entity.

Booking entities are required to hold a booking entity authority (BEA).

There are currently more than 14,000 approved BHSLs.

BACKGROUND

Applications for a Booked Hire Service Licences (BHSL) opened on 1 October 2017. All vehicles providing ride-booking services in Queensland must have a Booked Hire Service Licence. Existing requirements for taxi and limousine licences remain in place. From 15 January 2018, drivers, operators and booking entities without a BHSL can be fined up to \$20,184 for the first offence. A BHSL is an annual licence and TMR cannot confirm how many BHSLs are actively being used at a particular time.

The first 30 modified crates are currently being tested, with four trial rail services since May successfully transporting cattle to date.

The remaining fleet will be progressively modified and reintroduced to service.

Background

In September 2017 Aurizon initiated a temporary pause of rail following three incidents occurred whereby a ramp on a cattle crate unexpectedly released during transit. No injuries to people or cattle were reported.

No customers have been financially disadvantaged by using rail replacement road services for livestock orders that would normally be transported by rail. All orders have been met without delays and with no financial impacts for customers.

Aurizon and TMR have worked closely together to develop a program of works, including modifications to the crates' ramps, with key industry stakeholders providing positive feedback in a consultation forum earlier this year.

Before implementing changes to the network, TransLink held an extensive consultation process, seeking input from Toowoomba residents, Toowoomba Regional Council and local bus operator Bus Queensland, taking on board feedback to expand coverage and operating times.

TransLink has no plans to undertake another formal network restructure at this time.

TransLink recognises that the needs of communities change over time and will continue to monitor the performance of the network to ensure it is providing efficient and reliable services and infrastructure that meets the needs of the broader community.

Parts of the Toowoomba network still operates hail 'n' ride services, even if a dedicated bus stop is not provided. This allows passengers to hail a bus at any location where it is safe for the bus to pull over that is outside the CBD and not within 400m of an existing dedicated bus stop.

I am writing a story about Translink's review into what extra security measures might be needed at Capalaba bus interchange following separate assaults against bus drivers there last month.

I spoke to Transport Minister Bailey last Saturday, when he visited the Redlands, about the problem. He said Translink were reviewing CCTVs there, whether the area might need extra lighting and had deployed network officers to undertake extra patrols there.

I also spoke to Capalaba MP Don Brown who said he began pushing for a review of security measures there after an assault there about six to seven weeks ago. He said Translink's investigation had been stepped up recently following other assaults there last month.

Mr Brown said electrical wiring there needed to be looked into if any other cameras were to be considered.

I wanted to find out/confirm from Translink:

- 1) How many CCTV cameras are at the Capalaba bus interchange?
- 2) When the review by Translink into security measures at Capalaba bus interchange might be finished?
- 3) What action Translink policy advises bus drivers to take in instances of fare evasion or is fare evasion something tackled by network officers?

RESPONSE

There are 24 cameras located at the Bus Interchange and Park 'n' Ride facilities in Capalaba.

The two recent incidents at the Capalaba bus interchange are currently under investigation. Pending the completion of the investigations, TMR will consider any additional security measures required.

As an interim measure, TMR will continue to deploy Senior Network Officers and work with local police to provide an additional safety and security presence in the area.

As a result of an incident at Capalaba on Thursday 19 July, a joint operation involving TransLink SNOs and QPS was conducted on Thursday July 26.

It is unacceptable for anyone to be confronted with violence on our public transport network. The Queensland Government is committed to working with operators, councils, QPS and other stakeholders to improve safety.

TransLink Senior Network Officers are a key component of TMR's strategy to address fare evasion and to improve customer service and safety across the TransLink public transport network.

TransLink and the Queensland Police Service (QPS) conduct joint operations targeting fare evasion and anti-social behaviour on public transport year-round across the state.

Brisbane City Council has announced it will start a region by region bus network review in the centenary suburbs of Brisbane in the coming weeks.

Deputy Mayor Adrian Schrinner said Translink was asked to come on board and do a joint review but it declined twice.

He said in January Translink cited the Commonwealth Games and recently it simply declined.

Why is Translink, the state's public transport authority, not doing a joint review of Brisbane's bus network when it is ultimately responsible for routes and services?

Robert Dow of Rail Back on Track said Translink's decision to not be involved was "appalling".

He said it was one of many examples that Translink did not have the resources or authority to get the basics of public transport correct.

He also cited the delivery of new trains "an absolute disaster" and the fact it does not issue timetables for replacement buses for train track work as further examples.

How does the minister respond to this?

Mr called on Translink to be taken out of DTMR, which he said was still primarily focussed on roads, and make it a properly resourced, standalone public transport authority.

TransLink recognises the needs of communities change over time and continually monitors the performance of the network to ensure it is providing efficient and reliable services and infrastructure that best meets the needs of the broader community.

On 22 June, TransLink advised Council that, whilst negotiations were underway for the new bus contracts for Brisbane City Council, TransLink could not commit to a formal review of the Centenary suburbs.

TransLink also provided BCC with a commitment for continued collaborative working after the conclusion of the contract negotiations.

We continue to investigate any opportunities and initiatives that may improve services for customers.

Since the start of NGR passenger services in December 2017, there has been an average of two to three trains starting passenger service every month – with a total of 23 NGR trains now in passenger service on the Airport, Gold Coast and Doomben train lines.

By August 2018, NGR trains had run more than 1 million Kilometres on the network.

The patronage figures referred to are now more than 12 months old.

The 2017-18 financial year saw a record number of trips on the TransLink South East Queensland public transport network. The 182.83 million trips was an increase of 5.4 million of 3.1 per cent higher than the previous financial year.

Train trips increased by 3.4 per cent, increasing by 1.7 million trips, while buses increased by more than 2 million or 1.8 per cent.

Western bus patronage increased by almost 400,000 trips in 2017-18, to 2.39 million, when compared to the previous year, which saw 2 million trips. This is an increase of 19.7 per cent.

The Ipswich-Rosewood line (all stations west of Darra) increased by 2.9 per cent in 2017-18, or about 95,000 trips, when compared to the previous year.

Growth in public transport use has been slowly building since the introduction of Fairer Fares in late 2016, which has provided more than \$111 million in savings for everyday families as at July 2018.

While we acknowledge there has been an increase in patronage on the Doomben line, the services on the line still have capacity for more passengers.

TransLink recognises the needs of communities change over time and continually monitors the performance of the public transport network to ensure we are providing efficient and reliable services.

Our network planning team engages regularly with the operators, including Brisbane City Council and Queensland Rail, on a range of network improvements. TransLink is also continuing to work with Queensland Rail on restoring services across the SEQ network.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR), rail service provider Aurizon and the cattle crate manufacturer SCF have consulted with key 'livestock on rail' industry stakeholders about proposed modifications to the cattle crates.

Participants included a key processor, cattle handlers (loaders and unloaders), animal welfare inspectors and peak body representatives.

Feedback provided by industry about the proposed modifications was overwhelmingly positive.

The upgrades to the crates has now started, with modifications incorporating feedback received from the consultation process.

A train set with the first modified cattle crates will be trialled / tested in the coming weeks, weather permitting, with the remaining fleet progressively rolled out thereafter. All necessary cattle crates are targeted to be in service for the peak period of the cattle

A transitional period has commenced, where rail-replacement road services are being offered to the market. Customers will not be financially disadvantaged by these arrangements with orders being met through the usual booking process. Rail-replacement road services will continue during the progressive roll-out of the modified cattle crates.

There have been 1,946 NGR services since the introduction of NGR trains late last year (up until 14 March 2018), which have travelled a total of 136,555 kilometres.

Of these, 20 services have reported door fauts resulting in delays of more than three minutes, with six resulting in train cancellations.

While door faults are commonplace on passenger rail services, the NGR project team and Bombardier are actively investigating this issue.

As a precautionary measure, Bombardler will provide additional mobile and on-train service technicians for NGR trains during the Commonwealth Games.

In an additional proactive measure, the doors on the entire NGR fleet are undergoing an intense technical review to ascertain if there any technical issues.

Door faults are not considered to present any security or safety issues.

A single door was impacted.

Today I am writing a story for online for the Southern Star/CM website (which will go in print next week as well) about the parking situation at Altandi Station in Sunnybank, which residents near the station claim is getting worse.

I have sent an inquiry to the local and state members re. the situation and how it can be resolved. It would be great to get some comments from Translink too.

Obviously I realise this issue is not something new, but from regularly visiting the area to chat with locals it seems more and more issues are arising. The demand for car parks has led to verbal altercations between commuters and residents, seen vehicles damaged from the narrowness of the street when it is filled to capacity and also residents are getting continuously parked in by commuters.

Reportedly the biggest growth in train passenger numbers in southeast Queensland has been at Altandi station in Sunnybank, with a rise of 120 per cent over five years - from 137,750 passengers in 2012-13 to 303,767 in 2016-17.

RESPONSE

As part of the planning for Stage 2, TransLink assessed the need for services between Gold Coast University Hospital and Helensvale after midnight.

Expected patronage was deemed to be so low that the costs associated with running tram or bus services could not be justified.

Tram service operating hours were slightly extended compared to the previous bus service to ensure connections with the last Gold Coast Line rail services at Helensvale.

TransLink is not proposing to extend the span of hours on the Light Rail, however Translink constantly reviews network demand to ensure it meets the needs of local communities.

Feedback from the community, where possible, is being used to inform the Detailed Business Case for Stage 3A, which will be complete by the end of 2018 for government consideration of the proposed route, station locations, procurement, financial and budget implications.

Background

Light Rail has continued to grow, with a 33 per cent increase in patronage since stage 2 came online.

This is an extra 1.9 million trips from December 2017 to September 2018 or

more than 7400 extra trips per day, compared with a similar period last year.

Bus connections are available until at least 7pm at all stations (except Mango Hill East which is not serviced by any bus routes).

The new bus network that was implemented with the opening of the Redcliffe Peninsula line underwent significant community consultation and delivered substantial benefits to the community including:

- increased connections to new train services and other bus services at key activity centres (for example, Westfield North Lakes shopping centre)
- increased frequencies on key corridors in the region, and remove services from quiet suburban streets to focus on these corridors
- provided an easier to understand bus network by reducing route numbers (but not reducing services)
- continued to provide connections to key activity centres
- expanded some routes into previously un-serviced areas and new growth areas.

While TransLink makes every effort to align bus services to train schedules, differences in service frequency, route lengths and traffic conditions mean this is not possible for every service.

Moggill District Sports Ground complex footpath connection

As the developer of Moggill District Sports Park, Council forwarded its development application to the State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA) and Transport and

Main Roads (TMR) for technical advice.

TMR and SARA did not include conditions for a footpath as there is no surrounding footpath to connect to or a nearby bus stop for public transport connections.

Moggill District Sports Ground complex bus extension

The demand for bus services to the Moggill District Sports Park is predicted to be low, particularly across a full day.

Extending the route to service the sports ground would also require significant upgrades to allow buses to safely turn around.

While there are no plans to change the current services, TransLink will continue to monitor the network to ensure it is providing efficient and reliable services and infrastructure that meets the community's needs.
